HIS OWN STORY

Hyde's Testimony Brought Him Life Behind Bars.

CYANIDE TALE DOUBTED

Jurors Could Not Believe Doctor Had Forgotten Where He Bought the Drug.

Kansas City, May 16.-Dr. B. Clark Hyde, whom a jury today found guilty of slaying Col. Thomas H. Swope by poison, and sentenced to life impris-onment, owes his conviction to his own testimony on the witnesses' stand, according to a statement made tonight by W. C. Crone, the juror who decided the physician's fate after nearly three

days of balloting. Until Saturday night Mr. Crone and Juror Johnson, a farmer, held out for acquittal against the rest of the jury. Remembering Dr. Hyde's demeanor on the stand, Mr. Crone finally decided the physician's fate by voting for conviction and persuading Mr. Johnson

"Dr. Hyde was his own worst enemy in the trial," said Mr. Crone tonight. "His own testimony convicted him." Cyanide Story Doubted.

"When Dr. Hyde said he had bought cyanide for ten years, and yet could not remember where he bought it, he damned himself as a witness. If he had not testified as he did, I think he would not be in the position he is. "At first I believed Hyde innocent, and until Sunday night I voted to acquit him. Then I recalled his testimony about his cyanide purchases and decided he was guilty. I told Mr. Johnson I had changed my vote and I talked about my decision, I think my reasoning had an effect on him."

Mr. Crone's son, Albert, was recently sentenced to 18 years in the penitentiary for killing Bertha Bowler, his sweetheart

The return of the verdict today was marked by an absence of dramatic features. Mrs. Hyde cried when she heard the verdict in the court room. Dr. Hyde did not change his usual stoical appearance.

Mrs. Logan O. Swope was unnerved when, at her home in Independence, she heard the outcome, but she soon regained her composure. It was what she had been fighting for, and she was satisfied, she said

Believes Verdict Just. "If I had not been satisfied I was going right," she said, "I would never have started this prosecution of my son-in-law. I am convinced justice has been given the defendant. Of course, it does not behoove me to say whether I want to see him hanged. "As for a reconciliation with my daughter, I stand now as I have always stood.
