Alexandra's Tribute Has Place of Honor On Edward's Bier.

London, May 17.—(Whit Monday, 1910, as seen in London differs from its predecessors, inasmuch as it presented a much more chastened aspect than usual.

The inhabitants of the city hastened out of town, glad at heart to quit for a time the sombre-hued city and revel in the verdant freshness of the countryside.

A number of privileged persons, including members of the diplomatic service attached to the court of St. James' and intimate friends of the late King went to the throne room at Buckingham Palace, where the body of Edward VII. is lying in state. All the visitors paid the usual respect to the dead monarch.

A wealth of wreaths surround the catafalque and at the head of the casket there is a magnificent cross of white and mauve orchids, which is Queen Alexandra's own contribution. Among the floral tributes there is a wreath tied with ribbons of the Austrian national colors, which was sent by Emperor Francis Joseph.

The impression of the throne room, with its coloring of crimson and white,

which is always one of great space, has been heightened by the removal of all the furniture. A temporary altar stands beneath a heavy fringed canopy, which is banked at the sides with a profusion of hydrangea, while on the altar there are four vases containing white lilies.

WRECKED BY BLOW OF A WHALE'S TAIL

Ship's Bow Stove In, Crew Camps on Shore.

Juneau, Alaska, May 17.—An unusual disaster was suffered by the whaler Sorenson, owned by the Tyee Whaling Company, of San Francisco, which was wrecked by a blow of a whale's tail off Cape Carmaney last Thursday. The harpooned whale crushed the hull of the whaler, so that the vessel sank in four minutes. All the crew escaped in small boats.

The large whale was harpooned but after taking out much rope, it came back directly for the vessel. Passing under the stern it delivered a blow with its tail that smashed the hull, letting water in in floods. The crew camped on the shore and were picked up the following night. The whale was found dead next day.

CONVICTED BY HIS OWN STORY

Hyde's Testimony Brought Him Life Behind Bars.

CYANIDE TALE DOUBTED

Jurors Could Not Believe Doctor Had Forgotten Where He Bought the Drug.

Kansas City, May 16.—Dr. B. Clark Hyde, whom a jury today found guilty of slaying Col. Thomas H. Swope by poison, and sentenced to life imprisonment, owes his conviction to his own testimony on the witness stand, according to a statement made tonight by W. C. Crone, the juror who decided the physician's fate after nearly three days of balloting.

Until Saturday night Mr. Crone and Juror Johnson, a farmer, held out for acquittal against the rest of the jury. Remembering Dr. Hyde's demeanor on the stand, Mr. Crone finally decided the physician's fate by voting for conviction and persuading Mr. Johnson to do the same.

"Dr. Hyde was his own worst enemy in the trial," said Mr. Crone tonight. "His own testimony convicted him."

Cyanide Story Doubted. "When Dr. Hyde said he had bought cyanide for ten years, and yet could not remember where he bought it, he damned himself as a witness. If he had not testified as he did, I think he would not be in the position he is in."

"At first I believed Hyde innocent, and until Sunday night I voted to acquit him. Then I recalled his testimony about his cyanide purchases and I decided he was guilty. I told Mr. Johnson I had changed my vote and I talked about my decision. I think my reasoning had an effect on him."

Mr. Crone's son, Albert, was recently sentenced to 18 years in the penitentiary for killing Bertha Bowler, his sweetheart.

The return of the verdict today was marked by an absence of dramatic features. Mrs. Hyde cried when she heard the verdict in the court room. Dr. Hyde did not change his usual stoical appearance.

Mrs. Logan O. Swope was unnerved when, at her home in Independence, she heard the outcome, but she soon regained her composure. It was what she had been fighting for, and she was satisfied, she said.

Believes Verdict Just. "If I had not been satisfied I was going right," she said, "I would never have started this prosecution of my son-in-law. I am convinced justice has been given the defendant. Of course, it does not behoove me to say whether I want to see him hanged."

"As for a reconciliation with my daughter, I stand now as I have always stood. The doors of my house and my arms and heart are open to her whenever she wants to come home. My mother-love for her has never cooled. I have thought she was mistaken, but never that she was other than the sweet, innocent girl she is."

But Mrs. Hyde is not going back to her mother. She is still loyal to her husband and confidently believes the supreme court will free him. She is going to take up his fight immediately and battle on until he is freed or her funds are exhausted, she says.

"Clark is innocent, and he shall be freed," she declared.

Panic in Circus Crowd—Seven Children Sent to Hospital.

Newark, N. J., May 17.—Seven children were injured, two of them seriously, yesterday afternoon when a panic occurred at the Barnum & Bailey circus, at Sussex and First streets. The seven were hurried to the city hospital, some distance away, where it was found that Helen Comousky, 7 years old, had a fractured jaw, and severe bruises and cuts about the face and head. The doctors at the hospital say the others were injured only slightly.

which a mounted policeman was seated became frightened at the music at the circus and plunged forward. There was a large crowd of women and children waiting close by to go into the matinee performance. When they saw the horse coming toward them, some one shouted "A lion is loose!" and immediately the panic occurred. Women and children screamed and ran in all directions, scores of the women running into yards and jumping through windows in their frantic efforts to reach places of safety.

In the scramble a number of baby carriages were overturned and a number of small children were knocked down and trampled upon. It was seven of these children that were removed to the city hospital, while others were taken to their homes.

The policeman managed to get his horse checked after he had gone a few yards, but it was then too late to stem the tide of rushing women and children. It was some time before they could be made to understand the cause of the panic, and many of them refused to go into the circus, being too badly scared.

KING'S PHYSICIAN FOR THE COLONEL

Examines Mr. Roosevelt's Throat at the Suggestion of George V. of England.

London, May 17.—During his visit at Marlborough House yesterday Col. Roosevelt's hoarseness was so noticeable that King George inquired anxiously as to its cause, suggesting that the colonel consult a physician without delay. At the same time he recommended to him St. Clair Thompson, the celebrated specialist, who was summoned to attend his majesty's late father soon after the latter's recent return from Biarritz, when it was discovered that Edward's attack of bronchitis was assuming a serious phase. The King volunteered personally to arrange for a consultation with Dr. Thompson. As a result, Roosevelt's throat was examined by Dr. Thompson late last evening at Dorchester House while the guests were gathered for the dinner with Ambassador and Mrs. Reid.

BIG BEN TO TOLL.

London, May 16.—For the first time in its history the great bell of the clock tower on the Houses of Parliament, popularly known as "Big Ben," will be tolled every fifteen seconds while the coffin is passing tomorrow from the palace to Westminster Hall, and again on Friday while the cortege is leaving Westminster.
