NIGHT CLASSES FOR NEW SCHOOL

Industrial Training To Be Inaugurated in the Alexandra.

System Has Been Followed in Stratford With Great Success.

Night classes for industrial training will be established in the Alexandra school, as soon as it is ready for occupancy. At the meeting of the board of education yesterday afternoon, this was definitely decided upon. A special meeting of the board will be held on Nov. 14, to receive nominations for the advisory board for this, and after that the details of the industrial training will be worked out. A deputation from the Builders' Exchange, consisting of Messrs. E. H. Dennis, L. H. Martyn, and Charles H. Gould, were present, and urged the formation of night classes for this work. Mr. Dennis was spokesman for the party, and pointed out the necessity for such an institution in the city. Since the abolition of the apprenticeship system, there was a dearth of mechanics, and those qualified to lead in industrial enterprises. He quoted from the management of the Grand Trunk, that the board of education of that city had followed the lead of the Grand Trunk, and had established night classes. The result was that the boys of Stratford were receiving that benefit of technical training. Over 300 of them were being educated along

proper lines, and Mr. Dennis was of the opinion that a night school established here would produce equally as good results. The cost was not great. It was estimated that in Stratford, industrial training along the lines suggested was costing one cent per pupil per lesson, of which the Government paid half. "We did not come to suggest or instruct the board," said Mr. Dennis. "We are convinced, however, that the board would be doing a great thing for the young men of our city, if they established night industrial classes." Trustee W. W. Gammage was greatly in sympathy with the movement, and moved that the board establish the industrial classes as soon as the new Alexandra school was opened. Dr. Wyckoff suggested that action be postponed until the royal commission's report on technical education was published. However, the board thought that something should be done at once, and adopted Mr. Gammage's motion.

MAY CLEAR HERSELF

Mrs. Vermilya, of Chicago, May Try to Implicate Others in Murder Case. EDUCATION BOARD EXTENDS SYMPATHY

Trustees Order Condolences Sent to Family of Sir John Carling.

SALARY INCREASE ASKED

Women Teachers Request That the Maximum Be Run Up to \$900.

At a meeting of the board of education held on Tuesday afternoon a resolution of condolence with the family of the late Sir John Carling was passed by a standing vote. The aged senator was one of the board in the early fifties.

Trustee W. W. Gammage moved the following: "The board having heard with keen regret of the death of Sir John Carling, who in the early fifties was a member of the public school board for the City of London, and who was honored by his fellow-citizens with the most responsible offices in the gift of the people, all of which he filled with honor to himself and those whom he served."

"Be it resolved that this board extends to the family of the late Sir John Carling its deep sympathy in this time of bereavement, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the family."

Mention was also made of the death of Miss Slater, daughter of Mr. A. W. Slater, assistant drill instructor at the Collegiate, and a resolution of condolence will be forwarded to the family.

The women teachers of the city made a demand for an increase in salary. They desired that the maximum be raised from \$750 to \$900. They pointed out that the maximum has increased in every city in Ontario, with the exception of London, and it should be increased here.

No. 1 committee will deal with the request. There was no application on behalf of the principals for an increase.

On motion of Mr. C. M. R. Graham, J. K. H. Pope and E. R. Dennis were named members of the advisory board of the commercial school, at the Collegiate for an balance of 1914, and C. A. Whitman for two years and Mr. M. Aylesworth for three years, and the scheme is in proper operation.

Government by Commission. The board did not ratify a motion introduced by Trustee W. T. Strong giving their approval to the council's action in submitting a petition on the question of government by commission.

Some of the members thought that the motion would commit the board in favor of the idea. Trustee Graham, Treasurer Ord and Muggan spoke, declaring that they were not yet convinced that the functions of the board could be handed over to another body, and they could see no advantage in supporting the resolution. "I think the commission form of government controlling the board of education would be a good thing," said Trustee Hunt.

"My idea is to back up the council in their decision to allow the citizens to vote on this question," said Trustee Strong. "I do not care to have the board committed on the principle of government by commission should go to the people with our approval."

"That means that we favor the whole proposition," said Trustee Strong. "It is in favor of that at the present time."

After some discussion Trustee Strong's motion was carried, and they could see no advantage in supporting the resolution.
