Nov. 30—to Fort William, Port Arthur and beyond via Port McNicoll;
Nov. 22, to the Soo, and intermediate points on Georgian Bay and Lake Huron, via Owen Sound and the Northern Navigation Company; Nov. 15, to the Soo, and intermediate points on Georgian Bay and Lake Huron, via Owen Sound and the United States and Dominion Transportation Company.

FIRST METHODISTS WILL IMPROVE CHURCH ORGAN

It Is Proposed to Spend From \$12,000 to \$13,000 on the Work.

A number of members of the First Methodist Church who attended the mid-week prayer service last evening, at the conclusion of the meeting passed a resolution in which they gave their indorsement to a scheme to expend \$12,000 or \$13,000 in improvements to the church organ.

The necessity of undertaking a portion of the work without delay was emphasized in a demonstration by the organist, Mr. A. D. Jordan. The proposal is to overhaul the present organ and to make certain additions by means of which the instrument will be converted into one of the most modern type. The present manual is to be replaced, but will be attached to the rear of the instrument, and thus a keyboard and organ for Wesley Hall will be provided at small cost. In order to accomplish this it will be necessary to remove a portion of the brick wall between the church proper and Wesley Hall, but the supporters of the edifice will not be affected.

The committee in charge has arranged a scheme whereby the cost will be met in four annual installments, the first of which will fall due in July next.

SOCIAL SERVICE CLUB AT NEW ST. JAMES' CHURCH

Organization Was Launched at an Enthusiastic Meeting Held Last Night.

At a meeting held last evening in the schoolroom of New St. James' Presbyterian Church, a Social Service Club was formed, to consist of men only, the object and aim being the moral uplifting of the young men and women of the city.

Rev. T. H. Mitchell presided over the meeting, which was addressed by Sheriff Cameron, who gave an interesting statement of the conditions as they exist here. He drew attention to the fact that from Sept. 8 to Oct. 19, 1912, there were 58 juveniles (between the ages of 6 and 14 years), who appeared before Magistrate Judd for various offences. The cause of the great majority of those thus appearing, was owing to their environment, which was not conducive to their moral welfare.

Reference was also made to the splendid work done by the Children's Aid Society, which in twenty years has placed in foster homes 570 children, all of whom, with but a very small percentage, have turned out well, and are a credit to themselves and to the society. A large group photograph was shown of 250 of such children surrounding a photo of the venerable and beloved Inspector Mr. Sanders. A finer group of children, happy and healthy, could not be seen anywhere.

Several speakers followed, speaking along the lines suggested by Sheriff Cameron, and showing the urgent need that exists for a concerted movement on the part of all citizens, irrespective of creed, to take steps at an early date to try and improve the moral welfare of the young.

A committee was formed to make plans for the organization and work of the club, and it is intended to hold meetings each Wednesday evening (except the first Wednesday of the month), which will be addressed by speakers who are interested in the movement.

The meeting next Wednesday will be addressed by Major McGillivray, of the Salvation Army.

The meeting last evening was well attended, and all were enthusiastic over the work proposed.

INGERSOLL'S STREETS

NEED CLEANING

Recent Rains Turned Some Thoroughfares Into Sea of Mud.

Ingessoll, Nov. 14.—Some needed street cleaning is now in progress. The work has been commenced on Thames street south, where, owing to the recent rains, much mud had formed. Clean streets are always admired, not only by the residents of a town or city, but all visitors, and it is pleasing to note that, although the season is advanced, that this work is in progress. In this very connection there arises one question, why did ratepayers defeat the permanent improvement bylaw? It is to be hoped that next year there will be some very clearly defined plan for a continuance of street improvements.

At the howling alley this evening, Joe West, champion of Canada, and Frank Leslie, champion of Toronto, will hook up in a match against two local men. West is well known here, having frequently appeared at the alley, and there will no doubt be a large number of spectators.

Coal seems to be more freely distributed at the present time than for several weeks.
