INCREASED CAPACITY AT THE SANATORIUM

A Better Heating System Will Also Be Installed For Next Winter.

The Queen Alexandra Sanatorium is to have its capacity increased and a more adequate heating system installed. This was decided Friday night at the regular meeting of the London Health Association, which was held in the board of trade rooms.

Although the accommodation provided is adequate to meet the present needs, there is necessity of better heating arrangements from that which was experienced last winter, which was not in the least desirable. In summer many of the patients are housed in cottages, and as the number of patients are increasing, the need for larger quarters is being felt. The estimated cost for these improvements will amount to over \$5,000.

The present debt of the institution is \$15,000. To place it on a solid financial basis the sum of \$20,000 will be required. The sanatorium is doing excellent work, according to Inspector Bruce's report for June, it showed that six patients had been entirely cured from tubercular trouble. The board of trustees, who support it, felt justified in asking the different municipalities to support it to raise the necessary funds to maintain the extra expense involved.

A representative attendance of the members were on hand at Hon. Adam Beck, the president of the association, was in the chair.

A special meeting of the board will be held shortly for the purpose of ratifying the improvements proposed.
