and Street Railway
Directors Will Confer

Meeting Will Be Held This Week To Pick Out a Site For New Ball Park--Several Sites Will Be Considered.



MEETING of the London Baseball Club directors and the directors of the Street Railway Company will be held this week for the purpose of going over a few sites for a new ball park. The meeting was to have been held Monday, but it has been postponed until later in the week. It is possible that the Street Railway Company and London club will likely get together and build one of the best ball parks in the Canadian League for London, and one that will put Tecumseh Park into the discard as far as looks are concerned.

The outcome of the meeting will probably be made public if some definite agreement is reached between the two parties. The London baseball club must act quickly in the matter of securing a park for next season, and as the Street Railway Company has some pretty likely spots to offer, and is said to be willing

to go half-way in the matter of erecting a fine ball park, it is expected that no trouble will be met with in arriving at an agreement. The new ball park will be situated close to the heart of the city, almost as near to Tecumseh Park. It is expected, and the site may also be used for a new hockey arena. If it is decided to build a ball park on the grounds it is fully expected that the whole location will be turned into a big amusement park, and it will not only be used for baseball, but for every other line of sport. "Concrete stands and bleachers, and one of the best baseball diamonds in Canada will be put in if the deal goes through."

Later. The directors of the London Baseball Club will accompany the street railway directors at 3 o'clock this afternoon in a trip about the city in a special car to view several sites in connection with erecting a new ball park.

SOX AND GIANTS WILL BE
ROYALLY ENTERTAINED

Members of World Tour Will Have Big Thanksgiving Dinner-Board Steamship Empress of Japan.

The departure of the globe-trotting diamond players, the White Sox and the Giants, on the most stupendous expedition ever undertaken in the history of America's national game, recalls to the mind of the older generation of sportsmen a similar tour which started out a quarter of a century ago.

In 1888 a tour was set a-going, and sponsored by a Chicagoan, Albert B. Prince. Prince was known as the "Chicago" and the other as the "All-Americans." This was the first baseball world journey ever made. In 1874 a baseball team had visited the British Isles, and it was quite natural in mapping out the second enterprise that attention be directed to the opposite direction, where baseball was an unknown sport.

In every respect the White Sox and the Giants, on the most stupendous expedition ever undertaken in the history of America's national game, recalls to the mind of the older generation of sportsmen a similar tour which started out a quarter of a century ago.

They will sail from Vancouver on the Empress of Japan on Nov. 19 for Japan and China. The Canadian Pacific Railway have made extensive preparations for Thanksgiving Day celebrations on board the Pacific Empress, and an elaborate American dinner will be given Thanksgiving night.

After playing exhibition games at Yokohama, Tokio, Kobe and Nagasaki, the ball players, who will be under the charge of Manager Comiskey of the American League, will proceed to Shanghai, China, where enthusiastic Americans have raised a large purse for their entertainment.

Chas. A. Comiskey, father of the world tour, is known all over the world as "The Old Roman." He is the popular owner of the White Sox, and has been identified with the national game since it was in its infancy. Most of the progress since the game was first played is due to the fertile brain and indomitable will of the famous manager. From Shanghai the players will go via Hong Kong to Australia, Port Said and Europe, finishing up with a series of games in Great Britain.

The fast pacer Pickles, 2:03 1/4, likes the speedway game first-class and is doing all that expected of her in New York. Frank Bogash, Jr., having won \$24,325 this year, ranks second among all harness horses, Etawah being first and Tenara third.

Boston "Tar Baby" Outpointed by "Gunboat" Smith Last Evening.

Hint That Fight Was Not on Square—Spectators Were Divided in Opinion on This Point.

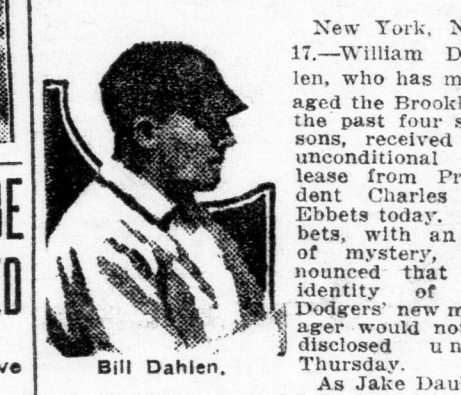
Boston, Nov. 17.—Gunboat Smith outpointed Sam Langford in their 12-round affair at the Atlas Club tonight and Referee Dick Fleming gave him the decision. Smith fought hard after the first four rounds and in the fifth opened his opponent's left eye. There was no knockdown during the bout.

Smith's tactics were to hold off his man with left hand jabs, then swing with his right. Langford had a slight advantage in the sixth round and had altogether the better of the eighth and eleventh. In the second, fourth, fifth, tenth and twelfth, honors appeared to be even. Unsuccessful attempts were made during the afternoon by an attorney said to represent G. H. Benton, to induce the authorities to forbid the meeting on the ground that the fight was not to be on the square. The spectators were divided in opinion on this point.

Smith is the first fighter to gain a decision over Langford since Young Peter Jackson beat the Tar Baby in 15 rounds at Southbridge on June 14, 1906. Langford has fought 44 bouts since then, losing his 45th when he met "Gunboat."

Manager of Dodgers for Past Four Seasons Has Been Given His Release.



New York, Nov. 17.—William Dahlen, who has managed the Brooklyn Dodgers the past four seasons, received his unconditional release from President Charles H. Ebbets today. Ebbets, with an air of mystery, announced that the identity of the Dodgers' new manager would not be disclosed until Thursday.

As Jake Daubert is in Cuba, it was pointed out today that he could not arrive at Ebbets Field on Thursday. It was pointed out that if Daubert, if the matter could be left to Brooklyn fans, would be appointed manager. Many candidates have been named for the job, including Roger Bresnahan, Dan McGraw, the Great McKinney, and Newark, Hugh Jennings, Hugh Duffy and Jake Stahl. The gossips added the name of James Sheppard to the list.

It was hinted today that Dahlen cannot find a suitable berth with some other major or minor league club, he had been engaged as the Brooklyn club's scout. It was also rumored that Dahlen would receive an offer to handle one of the teams in the Federal League.

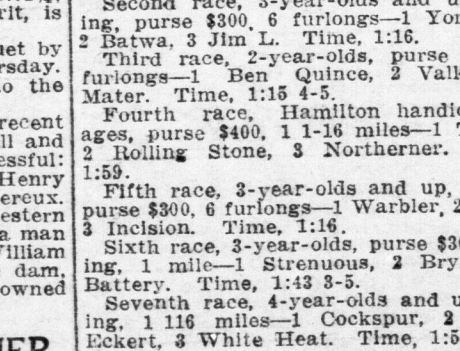

Frank Shaughnessy, Collector of Scalps and Other Trinkets

In 1909 he piloted the Roanoke team to the championship of the Virginia League. In 1910 and 1911 they finished second. He was also president of the Ottawa club that year, during which he sent the players to Ottawa, and enigmatically told them to win the Canadian League championship.

Last fall he took hold of the McGill club and turned it into a championship aggregation, beating Varsity in the saw-off. They lost one game.

This summer he managed the Ottawa baseball club, and won the Canadian League championship, not because he had the best team in the league, but because of his own fighting qualities.

Now he has come through with another victory, and he is going to win the Varsity boys on their own field for the first time in seven years. Shaughnessy, who is the most modest of all the footballers who clustered about the Prince George after Saturday's match, in this morning he humbly admitted that McGill had a chance. After the game he was so busy receiving the handshakes of his friends and the telegrams from Montreal that he hardly had time for any comment. "The fellows all played good football," said Shaughnessy, "and I'm glad it is over. The strain was too much this fall."

This District Title
Will Travel Some

The Present Indications Are That London Will Be Grouped With Five Strong Cities in the Intermediate O. H. A. Series.

If the London Intermediates win the O. H. A. championship this winter it is likely they will do it right in their own district. From present indications the local intermediate district will be one of the best and strongest in the O. H. A., and the team that survives ought to go right into the finals without the least difficulty.

A Strong Group.
It will likely be a six-team group, with Woodstock, Paris, Ingersoll, Brantford, Stratford and London in it. It will undoubtedly be the largest group in the O. H. A., and when one considers the teams that have represented these places in the past, there is little hesitation in saying it will be one of the strongest. Woodstock will be back in intermediate ranks this season, after an absence of a year. Several of last year's Woodstock Junior finalists will be on the team, and this alone assures the Baby City a last aggregation.

With Russ Sandercock at the head of it, it will be a hard team to beat. Ingersoll is also going back to intermediate ranks after a year's absence, and although the material in that town will be largely new, a number of good men have been secured. George Mason,

who played with Simcoe Intermediates last season, is looking after the Ingersoll team. He owns the Ingersoll arena, and is well known in local hockey circles.

Stratford will be a newcomer in this district. The Classic City has been standing still in the matter of an intermediate hockey team for the past couple of years, but this year, it is said, the city is waking up, and it is likely the senior team of last year will be entered as intermediate this year.

Paris has applied to the O. H. A. to be put in a different group than London, the defeat of last year apparently ranking yet, but it is likely the Underwear Town will be back again this year in this district with just as good a team as last year. Brantford also has a good team; in fact, the Telephone City has collected a classy bunch of players together, according to stories from that place.

Some Real Hockey.
The six cities in this district are undoubtedly the cream of Western Ontario hockey centres, and the team that captures the district title will know it has played some real hockey long before that coveted honor is gained.
