

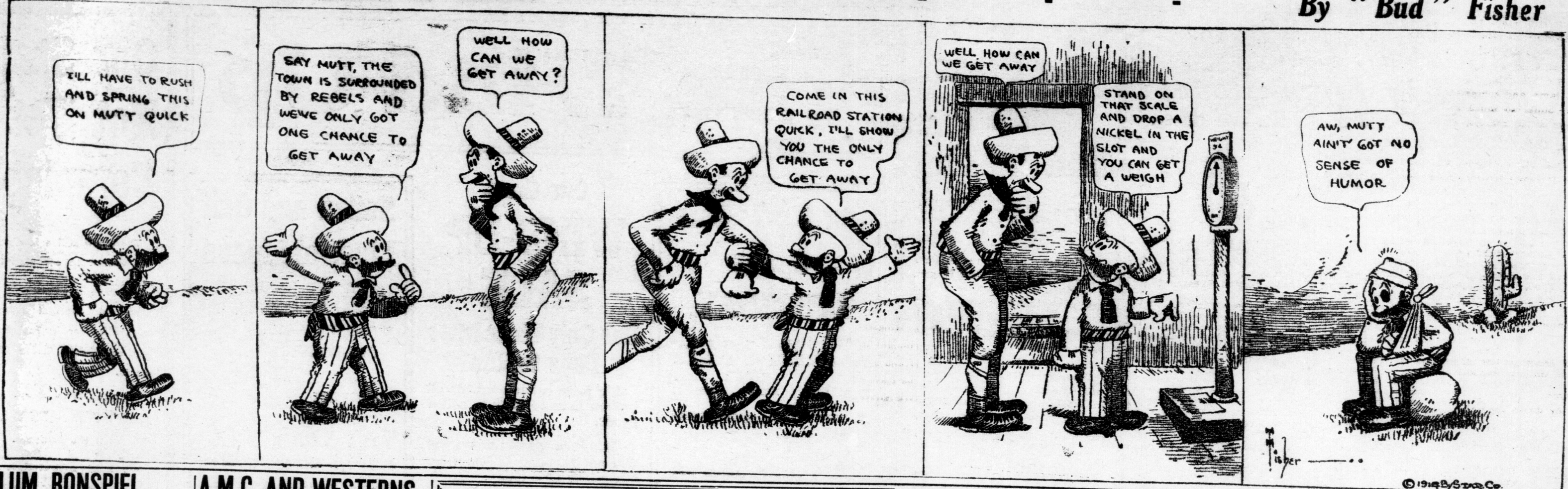

PERUVIAN PRESIDENT CAPTURED IN PALACE

Taken Prisoner by Revolutionists—Premier and Civilian Killed.

Lima, Peru, Feb. 4.—The president of the Republic of Peru, Guillermo Billinghurst, was taken prisoner today by military revolutionists, who attacked the presidential palace under the leadership of Col. Bonavides.

Premier Killed.
General Enrique Varela, premier and minister of war and marine, was killed in the sharp fighting which ensued.
Dr. Augusto Durand, a former revolutionary leader, whose arrest was sought by the police yesterday, took possession of the palace, and it is generally believed that he will form a new government.

Inhabitants Alarmed.
The attack on the palace began at half past four in the morning. Thousands of the inhabitants of Lima dashed into the streets alarmed by the fighting. Soldiers fired volleys into the air in order to prevent the formation of crowds in the streets, and this order kept the people moving from place to place.
Civilian Shot.
In the vicinity of San Pedro church a civilian was killed by a bullet.
Great alarm prevailed throughout the city and banks and stores were closed and private houses barricaded. The street cars however, began running before noon.

London and Western Motor Club to Nail Up 1000 Signs This Year

Will Cover Western Ontario With Signs Guiding Tourists to Every Section of This Peninsula—Enthusiastic Meeting of Executive.

Several matters pertaining to the improvement of motoring in Western Ontario were dealt with at a luncheon held at the London and Western Motor Club by President George M. Reid, in the Manor Tea Rooms last evening. The gathering was a large one, and the members present most enthusiastic.

A Boon to Tourists.
One of the principal steps taken at the meeting was the adoption of a motion to purchase and nail up a thousand signs throughout Western Ontario, instructing motorists in the routes they wish to take, and giving the names of the villages, towns and cities along the way. These signs will be tacked up all over the western peninsula, on every road leading to, from or around London. Signs bearing the words "To London" will also be nailed up, pointing in this direction to guide tourists wishing to come here. A committee composed of Mr. A. E. Silverwood, Mr. H. Keene, Mr. C. E. Bernard and Mr. Samuel Stevely was appointed to take charge of the work of seeing that these signs are purchased and distributed.

An Important Question.
The club also dealt with the membership problem, and as a result a big effort will be made by the present members to double and triple the present number of members. Several important matters affecting motorists are at present before the Ontario Government, and it is necessary that the automobile men get together to help along their interests. The Provincial Government is at present considering the question of licensing auto owners according to the horsepower rating of their cars, a dollar being charged for each horsepower. By this system licensees would jump to \$25, \$35 and \$50 a year. The Ontario Motor League is, however, endeavoring to combat this move and have the cars licensed at 50 cents per horsepower instead. The power of the cars will be rated in English fashion, which is comparatively low compared to the other methods. The London and Western Motor Club is prepared to stand behind the O. M. L. in its fight, and the larger the membership the better the motorists are equipped to deal with it.

To Tackle Insurance Problem Also.
The question of automobile insurance was also brought up. The O. M. L. is at present working to have a good blanket policy of insurance which will cover accidents and other mishaps to cars drawn up, and it needs the support of the club.

INGERSOLL RUFFIANS LANDED BY POLICE

Men Who Assaulted Hagerman Will Come Up for Trial.

London Fans Got One Fellow Captured by Alf, Gatecliff and Alf. Hall, Is One of the Parties.

Chief Fysh, of Ingersoll, notified Secretary Barney Vining, of the London Hockey Club, that the men who committed the assault on Hagerman Monday night had been apprehended, and they will appear in the police court to answer to the charge. Several witnesses are being gathered for the case, and it is likely a couple of London fans will also be called upon to testify. A couple of Woodstock fans were right near the men when the assault was committed have offered to appear, and there will be no lack of evidence.
