NO SCHOOL SITE SECURED

"THE UNPARDONABLE SIN"

Joe Hanley Delivers Stirring Address in Men's Campaign.

Another big audience, probably the largest which has turned out to the men's campaign meetings in the Auditorium, heard Joe Hanley last night talk on the subject, "The Unpardonable Sin." Hanley outlined God's plan of salvation, declaring that it is an easy matter to accept Christ, and that it is our fault if we do not take advantage of the opportunity. "When you reject the Holy Ghost—when you 'turn down' the Holy Ghost—that's the unpardonable sin," he declared.

"God did not make man an automatic concern. He gave us freedom of choice. Jesus Christ was either divine or else he was an impostor or a liar. It is up to us to take Christ as the divine man. The Lord did not make a hell for us. You can't find it in the Bible, from cover to cover.

"When you take the divinity out of Jesus Christ, you are knocking the pins out of our religion. I believe they killed Jesus on the cross when those men turned their faces from him and would have nothing to do with him. I am not trying to hypnotize you into believing what I am telling you in these addresses," Hanley said. "For I would like to see the man who could hypnotize a London audience."

ASKS COUNTY TO INSURE ITS MEN

Lieut.-Col. Robson Appeals To Council To Protect Middlesex Volunteers.

MAY GIVE TOWARDS FUND

County Council Will Probably Donate More Than Relief Grant Suggested.

Lieut.-Col. Bart Robson, Stratford, of the Twenty-sixth Light Infantry, asked the Middlesex county council at the yesterday afternoon session for the volunteers from the county who have joined the Canadian contingents now at Salisbury Plains, and those who are now enlisting for the sum of \$1,000.

"Insuring the lives of our soldiers going to the front is even better than the donation of money to the patriotic funds, in my estimation," he said. He pointed out that the city of London had insured all the men from the city who have gone to the front. Several of the councilmen explained that many of the volunteers have already insured the lives of men who have enlisted. Colonel Robson's request was considered by the financial committee of the council this morning.

The financial committee at yesterday morning's session recommended that a grant of \$1,000 be made to the London and Middlesex Patriotic Fund Association on Jan. 1, and \$1,000 every three months, while the war lasts. This met with a good deal of discussion by the council in the afternoon, and the matter was laid over for further discussion on Thursday. The general opinion of the council was that a larger grant should be made immediately.

Reeve F. W. Bolton declared that the county of Middlesex was not making a donation merely to appear well beside other counties, which have already made donations to the patriotic fund, but that it was felt by the council to be a matter of patriotism with them, and that the grant should be as large as possible. Sam Oakes said that the grant proposed by the financial committee was not nearly large enough for Middlesex County. It was also pointed out that the war may last for considerable time, and before it would be over, succeeding councils might wish to dispose of their money to other patriotic uses. It is probable that a larger donation will be made by the county, to be handed over to the Patriotic Fund immediately.

Caring for Soldiers.

On the other hand, Charles Rush declared that with the great slaughter of men in Europe, the war could not last a great length of time, and that if the war ended shortly, Middlesex would be away behind in her patriotic donations, compared to other counties. Many of the townships are caring for the soldiers they have sent to the front and their dependents without aid from patriotic funds or the Government.

Applications have been received for the office of high constable for the County of Middlesex to succeed High Constable James Campbell of Thorncliffe. This officer must now live in London. The salary recommended by the finance committee was \$450 per annum.

Appoint Glencoe Man. Lewis Smith, of Glencoe, was appointed as county representative of the Glencoe High School Board for the balance of the term of Malcolm McGregor, who is now in the West.

The request from the Ontario Winter Fair, at Guelph, for a grant of \$250 was referred to the agricultural committee. Accounts from London Township for expenses entailed by the small-pox epidemic recently, amounting to \$22,338, and from Queen Alexandra Sanatorium for maintenance of patients there, amounting to \$278, and an account from the Victoria Home for incurables for \$155, were presented and will be examined later.

The council will attend a banquet given by Warden L. L. McTaggart this evening, at 8 o'clock, in the Fraser House.
