The proposed measures of reprisal against Germany, the Premier said, would be enforced with strict observance of the dictates of humanity, but the Allies did not purpose "to allow their efforts to be strangled in a network of judicial niceties." There was no intention, he explained, to confiscate detained ships or cargoes unless they were liable to confiscation under the ordinary conditions of war.




