You speak to me of the Cathedral of Rheims, which the Germans continue to attack. But from the beginning I directed the cardinalarchbishop at Cologne to express my complaints to the Emperor, and to ask him to spare religious edifices in future.

ENEMY'S SUBS FAILED

Damage To Ally's Warships Is Quite Insignificant, Says Report.

[Canadian Press.] Petrograd, July 3, via London, 10:36 .m.—When the Russian naval squadron in the Baltic gave battle to five German today by the Russian Admiralty under SHOT TO PREVENT date of July 2. The damage to the Russian cruisers, the statement adds, was nsignificant.

The text of the statement follows: "This morning (July 2), along the parallel of the Oestegarn lighthouse, on the east coast of the Island of Gothland, our cruisers encountered, in a fog. two of the enemy's light cruisers and some torpedo boats, and engaged them.
"At 9 o'clock in the morning a German cruiser, badly damaged, lowered her flag and ran ashore. The other ner nag and ran asnore. The other cruiser and the torpedo boats fled.
"At 10 o'clock our squadron encountered the armored cruiser Roon, one light cruiser and one torpedo boat, and renewed the battle.

"At 10:30 o'clock the enemy began to

retire towards the south. During the retreat the enemy was joined by another light cruiser. This vessel was attacked by our cruisers and fled. At 11:20 o'clock the pursuit ceased.

"After the battle our squadron was unsuccessfully attacked by submarines.
