

FORMER MAYOR IS SWORN IN TODAY AS DEPUTY JUDGE

J. H. A. Beattie Sits in Division Court for First Time.

18 CASES IN MORNING

Takes Oath of Office Administered by County Crown Attorney.

Ex-Mayor J. H. A. Beattie is once more entitled to a prefix to his name. He is now "Deputy Judge Beattie." The long expected commission, appointing him as a deputy judge of the county court of Middlesex for the next three months, arrived from the federal department of justice at Ottawa this morning, and the new deputy judge was immediately sworn in. The oath of office was administered by County Crown Attorney McKillop.

Although the announcement of Mr. Beattie's temporary appointment was made some time ago, and it was expected last Saturday, he has not acted before the arrival of his commission. Immediately following the administration of the oath of office, Judge Beattie took his place on the bench, and presided over the session of the first division court. Because of the death of Judge Elliott and the absence of Judge Talbot Macbeth on his vacation, there has been no session of the division court for some time. The result was an accumulation of cases. In all 18 were disposed of this morning and 10 more were tried this afternoon.

Judge Beattie received the congratulations of his brother members of the Middlesex bar on his elevation to the bench, though it has been announced that it is but temporary.

PAVEMENT REPAIR CONTRACTS GO TO OTTAWA COMPANY

Board of Control Awards Resurfacing Jobs.

REMIT STATUTE TAXES

Those Discharged From C. E. F. as Medically Unfit Don't Have To Pay.

The Standard Paving Company of Ottawa was awarded the contract for resurfacing a portion of Wellington and York streets by the board of control today, at \$150 a yard, and was also given the contract for patching the Dundas street pavement, between Adelaide and Elizabeth streets, at 50 cents a yard. The work will be done at once. The contractor also has been awarded the contract for patching the Tiffin, Ohio, some time ago was shipped on Monday last, and will be in the city shortly.

Men who have been turned down after serving some time in the C. E. F., as being physically unfit, will have their statute labor law remitted.

George Winder was given the contract for painting the King street bridge for \$550, and the Adelaide street bridge for \$550.

City Treasurer Bell estimated that 70 per cent of the Patriotic Fund tax of 2 mills had been collected, and \$40,000 was ordered handed over to the association.

Some minor questions were disposed of.

SHOULD FOLLOW QUEBEC'S GROUND RENTAL SYSTEM

This is Mayor's Suggestion on Telephone Question to Controllers.

Mayor H. A. Stevenson informed the board of control that the province of Quebec charged the Bell Telephone Company a ground rental for all poles erected, and he does not see why the same should not apply to London and the province of Ontario.

"If it is a good thing for Quebec, and I think it is, why should it not be a good thing for us?" he asked. "We should get something from the company and I am going to look it up."

The Union of Canadian Municipalities will prepare a report on the question, and submit it to the council shortly.

WILL PURCHASE RELIEF SUPPLIES IN LONDON

City Donation to Fire Sufferers To Be Expended Here.

The city council, if the recommendation of the board of control passes, will expend \$1,000 for the sufferers from the fire in New Ontario in London.

The board of control a week ago voted this amount, provided it could be raised, and this morning City Treasurer Bell reported that there was a sufficient sum in the relief account to meet this expenditure.

"We should spend this money in town," said Mayor H. A. Stevenson. "We can send a carload of stuff to the north country, and get credit for it." The controllers agree with us, and it is expected that the money will be used in a similar way.

CANADIAN RED CROSS AND THE ALLIES

The accompanying facts about the Canadian Red Cross Society are herewith published for the first time. They were given to The Advertiser by Lieut.-Col. Noel Marshall, honorary secretary of the Canadian Red Cross Society, and chairman of the executive committee, on the occasion of his visit to London on Thursday, when he addressed the annual meeting of the London branch, and was taken from a report he is compiling for Premier Sir Robert Borden.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has 7 provincial branches.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has 627 local branches.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has sent 68 Red Cross nurses to England and France.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has sent to England or purchased in England 150 motor ambulances.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has sent to Belgium \$100,000 worth of supplies.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has forwarded to Russia \$75,000 worth of supplies.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has sent to Serbia cash amounting to \$12,000.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has sent to Serbia supplies amounting to a value of \$75,000.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has sent to Italy cash amounting to \$10,000.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has sent to Montenegro cash amounting to \$20,000.

GENTLEMAN OF MANY UNIFORMS RETURNING TO CLAIM \$10,000 FROM RAILWAYS

Expected to Again Visit London Because Woodstock is Unkind.

John Anderson, a colored "gentleman," who favored London with his presence for a year, has returned to Woodstock not quite so sociable as this city. John is a wandering person, whose chief aim in life was the accumulation of weird uniforms.

He was a rare treat to the soldiers in camp here, and they used to rig him out in the wildest creations. The justly celebrated coat of many colors, worn by Joseph of old, could not have been much more striking than John's haberdashery. It might be said that John favored the Futurists in his artistic tastes.

With all these clothes, the only thing that worried John was where to get something to eat. The soldiers used to give him hand-outs, and citizens were kind to him.

He slept in the city in the winter, and in Springbank Park in the summer. He always managed to find a hole in which to crawl. So far as can be learned, he was not afflicted with work. In fact, he and labor were entire strangers to each other. John was sent out of Woodstock, and is expected back in London in a day or two.

LONDON SOLDIERS TO CLAIM \$10,000 FROM RAILWAYS

Rebate On the Camp Borden Tickets Means That.

OVERCHARGE HAS BEEN \$1

Under One Cent Per Mile Order Return Should Cost \$3.30.

If the rebate, demanded from the railway companies by soldiers at Camp Borden because of the overcharge since the commencement of the camp, goes into effect, it will mean that close to \$10,000 will be claimed by soldiers from this city. The discovery of the order-in-council that fixed railway transportation of soldiers, in parties of more than 350, at one cent a mile, means that a return trip from Borden to London would cost approximately \$1 less than the present fare. As there have been more than 1,000 soldiers coming into London every week for the last eight weeks, the total is easily figured.

Under the one-cent-per-mile rate the return ticket would cost \$2.30, as the mileage on both Grand Trunk and C. P. R. is approximately 165 miles, or 330 miles for a round trip. The present tariff is \$4.80 return.

The order-in-council, under which the rebate is being claimed, specified that it was to apply to second-class accommodation. The men who have come down from Borden claim that it has always been second-class (colonist) coaches that have been used for the enlisted men. The soldiers have been provided with first-class day coaches.

LOCAL G. N. W. OPERATORS AFFECTED BY INCREASES

Six of Local Staff Come Under Terms of New Agreement.

Six London operators of the Great Northwestern Telegraph Company are affected by the new wage agreement arranged by a special board of arbitration, the findings of which were announced from Ottawa on Thursday. However, the rates are as follows:

The schedule governing rates of pay has, however, for some reason, been withheld by the labor department.

The schedule covering rates of pay, it is stated, have been withheld by request both of employees and employer. According to a report from Hamilton, however, the rates are as follows:

Maximum salary for first-class operators, \$30 a month starting at \$20, and automatically advancing \$5 a year; second-class operators will start at \$20 a month and will continue until they graduate into the first-class grade; the minimum salary for all operators will be \$20.

Though the London office is not under the minimum, so far as the new scale is concerned, the highest wages paid here have been \$20 per month. The two week holidays, on pay, is a gain for the operators for they have been forced to provide and pay a substitute on their holidays heretofore.

Provision of uniform typewriters at cost by the company is another concession to the operators.

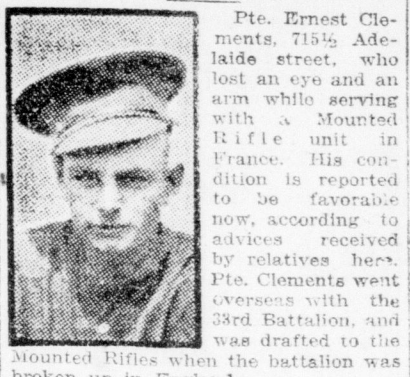

Controllers Say Official Must Be "Full Time" One.

MANY INQUIRIES MADE

Number of Accountants Desire Information on Vacant City Office.

The board of control had many inquiries today at its session, relative to the position of city auditor. The city clerk, after the last session, wrote to all the chartered accountants in the province, asking whether or not they will be available for service. Homer L. Lord, Toronto; J. Bunnell, Brantford; R. P. Spence, Toronto, and others wrote asking how much they would have to spend on the work, the salary, etc. Mr. Baker will answer their queries.

"We should have a man who will devote his whole time to the position," said Controller White. "He can engage him, clerical help he thinks required, but he should be available when we want him, and he should be paid a sufficient salary."

The other controllers agreed with that, and the auditor engaged will be asked to devote all his time to the position.

Application has been made for a permit for the extensive changes, which will cost \$15,000. The alterations will make more adequate provision for the carrying on of the Sunday school and young people's work, guiding the Boy Scouts and Girl Guides.

The Salvation Army has its own official architect at the Toronto headquarters, Brigadier Miller, who was at one time stationed in London.

SOUL-MATE RETURNS TO HIS HOME IN STATES

Hillman (Mich.) Elmer Deported to U. S. A. Thursday Night.

Thursday night London saw the last of Cosman Cameron, "soulmate extra-ordinary," and the last of a North Michigan romance that wound up in the city police court. Cameron was deported to the States on the request of Immigration Inspector Riggs, and was escorted back to the United States Thursday night. On Monday Mrs. Neva Devel, the young woman who came to Canada and to London as Cameron's "soulmate," went back to the United States under escort.

Cameron and his affinity came to Canada on their secondelopment from the North African town—Tilmon—where the two families had been neighbors for some time. Going first to St. Marys the couple moved to this city, and were traced from the States by a private detective agency.

Cameron, who is over 50, has a wife and family who will look after him. His affinity was half that age, and has a husband in Hillman. The pair lived as man and wife on Talbot street for some time before being apprehended by the police.

COMING TO LONDON ON OFFICIAL VISIT

A visit is expected in London in the near future of Col. John McMillan, the new chief secretary of the Eastern Territory of the Salvation Army. Col. 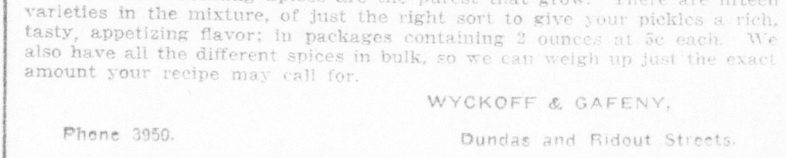
