# MINISTER SEEKING BUSINESS Polish Insurgents Planning

Premier Meighen Tries to Eva de, But Liberal Makes Scathing Criticism of Action of R. W. Wigmore in Using His Official Position Improperly.

I say that this is a matter of public issue whether a member of the cabinet has the right to use his position in this way to promote business for a firm with which until a few months ago he was connected. Attacks On Many Large Towns.

BERLIN. May 8.—Reports from German sources today declare that advices from Upper Silesia up to last night the situation there, caused by the Polish insurgent movement. 
