

Aged Greek Statesman Assumes Responsibility as Last Resort.

Associated Press Despatch. Athens, Jan. 11.—Ex-Premier Venizelos decided this morning to form a cabinet in which he will be premier without portfolio with George Roussos, Republican Liberal leader, as foreign minister, as the only possible solution of the protracted governmental crisis.

M. Venizelos reached this decision after General Danglis, who censented

yesterday to endeavor to form a ministry, had failed in the attempt, despite all-night effort. General Danglis' failure caused the keenest dissappointment to Venizelos and his decision to become pre-mier himself was taken as apparent ly the only course remaining open. The most prominent orthodox Liberals refused to co-operate in the forming of a Danglis cabinet. M. Kaundaris was next approached, but he declined the difficult task, and the

London, Jan. 11.—The British ubmarine L-24, rammed by the readnought Resolution yesterday is ying thirty fathoms deep about leven miles south of Portland Bill, ccording to the latest reports from Weymouth. While it is admitted that e information as to the craft's pohere is nothing to indicate that her rew of 43 men have not perished Inasmuch as no oil was noticed on he surface of the water after the submarine went down, it is supposed that the vessel's petrol tanks were not broken when the Resolution rammed her, although some of the searchers point out that any trace of oil would have been dispersed quicky by the rough sea.

Salvagers Kept Busy.

It is taken for granted that all the men were below when the boat left Portland for the manoeuvres in weather was too heavy to allow them to remain on deck. Until further investigation has been made it been impossible to tell just how the disaster happened. However, one of the latest reports says that the L-24 rose beneath the dreadnought and struck the latter's bows.

Had Close Call.

Lieutenant-Commander Eddis had mior officer of the submarine E-13 n 1915. Nearly all were shot down by the Germans. Lieutenant - Commander Eddis, one of the few men to escape, was interned in Denmark. It is reported, but not confirmed, that the submarine K-12, badly damaged in a ollision with the K-2 near the scene of the L-24's disaster, has sunk in
