It is interesting to note the progress that is being made by the Grand Trunk Pacific Ry., and for the information of the public we publish the following particulars regarding this great Transcontinental Ry. The lines at present in operation are as follows:

Fort William Northwest via Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Edmonton and Edson to Fitzhugh—1472 miles.

Prince Rupert to Copper River—100 miles.

Canora via Yorkton and Melville to Regina—151 miles.

Tofield, Alta. to Mirror—70 miles.

There is also a total mileage of about 900 on other sections of the Eastern Division which is in partial operation by construction trains. The following lines are under construction:

Fitzhugh, Alta. to Copper River, E. C.—618 miles.

Regina, Sask. via Moose Jaw northwest—93 miles.

Regina, Sask. to International boundary—90 miles.

Young to Prince Albert, Sask.—120 miles.

Oban to Battleford, Sask.—80 miles.

Mirror, Alta. to Calgary—124 miles.

Digger, Sask. southwest—50 miles.

Alberta Coal Branch—60 miles.

Split in British Labor Party

London, Oct. 26—Chancellor Lloyd George's national insurance bill for the consideration of which the House of Commons agreed to allocate most of the time of the autumn session, threatens the labor party. At a meeting of the party to-night the majority decided to support the bill, Messrs Snowden, Hewart, Lansbury and Thorn are among the dissenters, and refuse to abide by the decision. They intend to form a separate group.

Fatal Accident on Intercolonial

Brakeman, from York County Killed Herbert Malone, brakeman on the Fredericton to Chatham freight train was instantly killed at Chatham, N.S., at 7:35 Thursday morning, while engaged in his duties as brakeman. Mr. Malone was making a coupling between the engine and freight car on the siding and had taken off the chock block to allow the engine to start.
