Walton's Register for the year 1823 shows that there were 163 post-offices in Vermont at that time, and that about \$20,000 was annually paid on the postage of letters, papers, and pamphlets, by the citizens of Vermont. The compensation of the postmasters was on the basis of 20 per cent. on

the first \$100 of receipts and 25 per cent. on the next \$100. Brattleborough was then the largest office in the state. The salary of A. Green, the postmaster, was \$220.99. The value of postage was for a single letter of one piece of paper for any distance not exceeding 50 miles, 10 cents; over 50 and not exceeding 100 miles, 15 cents; over 100 and not exceeding 400 miles, 25 cents; over 400 miles, 35 cents. Letters composed of two pieces of paper were charged double those rates three pieces were charged triple rates, and more than three pieces quadruple postage. The highest salary paid any of the 400 postmasters in the United States was that of \$200, and there were only 19 who were paid that sum, while 27 received \$100 and upward. The population of the State was about 255,749, an increase of 17,659 in 10 years, of which 50,851 persons were engaged in agriculture, 776 in commerce, and 4464 in manufactures. There was an enrolled militia force of 20,781, and Gov. C.P. Van Ness was the Captain-General of the force.

PROPOSED BY-LAW, TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUE OF "General Consolidated Loan Debentures" TO THE AMOUNT OF \$51,000.

For the purpose of procuring a site and erecting a CATTLE MARKET THEREON. WHEREAS, by an Act passed by the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, in the forty-second year of Her Majesty's reign, and chapter seventy-five, entitled "An Act respecting the Debt and certain property of the City of Toronto," it is, among other things, enacted that the Corporation of the City of Toronto may pass a By-law or By-laws for authorizing the issue of Debentures of the said City for a sum not exceeding the whole sum of \$6,000,000, to be taken out of the fund of the said City, and that any such By-law or By-laws may be amended, altered, or repealed, and that any such By-law or By-laws may be applied or expended in improvements of like nature, the whole issue being nevertheless limited to the said sum of \$6,000,000.

And whereas the limitation of the issue of debentures to the said sum of \$6,000,000 was based on the assessment of the City at the time of passing of the said Act the sum of \$2,000,000, and it was further enacted that any increase of the said sum, together with interest thereon at the rate of four per cent. per annum, should not exceed the said sum of \$6,000,000, such increase being nevertheless limited to eight per centum of such excess;

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property in the City of Toronto, irrespective of any future increase of the same, and also irrespective of any income in the nature of tolls, interest or dividends from the works, or temporary stock, above or below the rate upon which the money to be so raised, or any part thereof, may be borrowed, and also irrespective of any income to be derived from the temporary investment of the sinking fund hereinafter mentioned, or any part thereof, according to the last revised Assessment Roll of the said City, being for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, is \$68,228,277;

And whereas the General Debt of the City, as controlled by the said Act, and exclusive of Loan Improvements debt, secured by special Act, rates or assessments amounting to \$5,534,894, leaving a full margin for the increase of the same in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, and which does not pass the principal or interest in arrears;

And whereas it is expedient and necessary to raise by loan on the credit of the said City a sum of money for the purpose of effecting certain permanent improvements in the said City, together with interest thereon at the rate of four per cent. per annum for forty years;

And whereas the estimated cost of the said improvements is \$51,000, made up as follows: For preparing a site and erecting, constructing and making the millinery and other works and improvements necessary for a new Cattle Market, \$51,000 00

And whereas it will require the sum of \$2,040 to be raised annually for a period of forty years, the ordinary of the debentures to be issued under and by virtue of this By-law, to pay the interest of the said debt, and the sum of \$252.50 to be raised annually during the same period for the forming a sinking fund of three-fourths of one per centum per annum for the payment of the debt created by this By-law, according to the provisions of the said Act, making in all the sum of \$2,292.50 to be raised annually as aforesaid;

And whereas it is necessary that each annual sum of \$2,292.50 shall be raised and levied in each year during the said period of forty years by a special rate sufficient therefor on all the rateable property in the said City of Toronto, at the rate of one-tenth of one per centum per annum, and to cause the same to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the said City, for the purposes and with the objects above recited.
