TO THE AMOUNT OF \$51,000,

CATHER MARKET THEREON.

That it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said municipality to raise by way of loan, upon the negurity of the debentures hereinafter mentioned, from any person or porsons, body or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of such debentures, a sum of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of fiftyone thousand dollars (\$51,000), and to cause the same to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the said City, for the purposes and with the objects above recited.

That it shall be lawful for the said Mayor to cause any number of debentures to be made for such sums of money as may be required, either in currency or sterling money, not less than one hundred dellars Canadlan currency, or twesty pounds sterling each, and not exceeding in the whole the sum of fifty-one thousand dellars (\$51,000), as in the preceding section mentioned, and that the said debentures shall be sealed

That the said debentures shall be made payable in forty years from the date of the issue thereof, either in currency or sterling, in this Province, Great Britain, or elsewhere, and shall have attached to them coupens for the payment of interest. IV.

That the said debentures shall bear interest at and after the rate of four per cent, ther annum from the date thereof, which interest shall be payable half-yearly, on the irst days of the months of January and July in each year, at the place where the said debentures are made payable, in this Province, Great Britain or elsewhere, as a terresaid.

That during forty years, the currency of the debentures to be issued under the authority of this By-law, the sum of two thousand and forty deliars (\$2040) shall be caised annually for the payment of interest on said debentures, and also the sum of three kundred and eighty-two deliars and fifty cents (\$382.50) shall be raised annually nor the payment of the said loan of fifty-one thousand dollars (\$51,000) on forty years, according to the provisions of the above recited Ast, making in all the sum of two thousand four hundred and twenty-two deliars and fifty cents (\$2422.50) to be raised annually as aforegaid, and that a special rate in the deliar upon the assessed value of this rateable property in the City of Toronto over and above all other rates, and which special rate shall be sufficient to produce in each year the said eum of two thousand four hundred and twenty-two deliars and fifty cents (\$2422.50), shall be annually levied and collected from the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six to the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, both years inchnitve, unless the said debentures shall be seener paid, for the parpose of paying the said aum of \$51,000, with interest thereon, as aforesaid.
