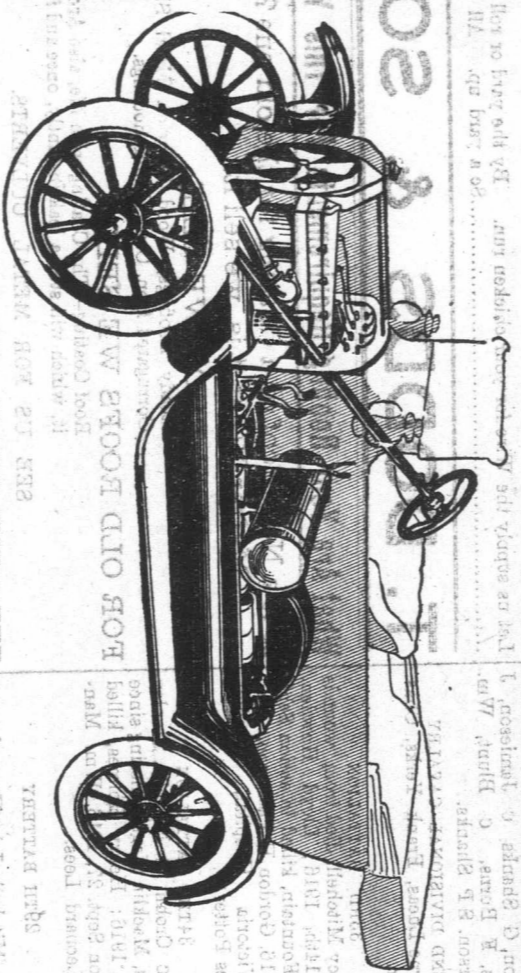

From One of the 149th Bramshot Camp, April 8, 1917.

DEAR MOTHER: I suppose you are wondering why I haven't written from me sooner but this is the first chance I have had to write a letter. I wrote a letter when we got on the boat in Halifax but didn't have a chance to send it so I am sending it along with this letter. We arrived in England yesterday morning. We had a little excitement just about a mile and sailed in a little, but it didn't sink her. It made quite a hole in the front of the boat but they got it fixed before any harm was done. We are camping at Bramshot. It is quite a camp. It is a hot like Camp Gordon. Two other battalions that the others went to some other camp. We got to our camp last night about five o'clock. We are camping in tents. It is just for ten days though, because we are quarantined for that long to see if there is any disease in our quarters. Well, we are in England in much the same as Canada. Nearly all the houses here are made of red brick. The houses here are many here. Each is divided into four or five apartments and eight men go in each apartment. The farm house is all sections in the fields working, but they do a lot of the heavy work over here. They work in the fields and railway yards and deliver mail and all that kind of stuff. There is a squire's stables outside. I heard one of the boys say that the boys are all here in a few days so I will see him. Both the Johnston boys are in England but not in this camp. I don't know where they are but I think we will have a course in musketry. There is a town about a mile from here but I forgot the name of it. It is pretty hilly around here but I think it will be a pretty good camp. Well I guess I will close for this time. With love,
