Council met and organized on Monday the 12th inst. pursuant to Statute.

Present: D. F. McIntyre, reeve, Albert G. Wight, A. D. Donald, Hugh Russell and John Vivian, Councillors.

The following by-laws were passed:—To borrow \$18000. for current expenditure, appointing Preston Marrison, Fruit pest Inspector, Thos A. Lampman, a member of the local Board of Health, Fred Sercombe and John H. Campbell, auditors; Robert Stevenson, assessor; and Thos. Ross, road superintendent.

The following orders were given: H. Russell, \$6. serving copies of Watson—Ross Drain by-law; Mrs. Henry Curtis, \$8.50, for gravel; A. C. Jamieson, \$3, for spikes; G. Coults & Son, \$28.68, for plank; Wm. Bryant, \$18.00 printing Watson—Ross Drain by-law, \$5.50, printing Gray Drain extension debentures, and \$80.20, for annual statement, etc.; John Patching, damages re Nesbit drain, \$11.00; G. Sutherland, \$83.50, election expenses; Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto \$5. and R. D. Thomson, \$2.00 inspecting break-water in Shawana Drain. The Clerk was instructed to procure six copies of The Municipal World.

Council adjourned to meet on Monday, February 9th, at 10 a. m. Geo. Sutherland, Clerk.

Council elect for the Township of Brooke, for the year 1925, met in Code's Hall, Alvinston, at the hour appointed by statutes.

Present:—Arthur E. Loosmore, Reeve; James H. Johnston, Deputy Reeve; Jas. E. Wallies, Nevin McVicar and Harry Wilcox, Councillors. Declarations of Office were signed by each. Johnston—Wallis, that W. J. Weed be appointed Clerk at a salary of \$500 and postage allowance but no extras for Township work.—Carried.

Johnston—McVicar, that Walter Annett be appointed Treasurer at a salary of \$200 and postage allowance.—Carried.

Applications for assessing received as follows:—Wm. Leitch \$175.00; Thos. Coristine \$150.00; H. Dundas \$140.00; John R. McVicar \$118.00; Wes. Werden \$120.00; James Bell \$125.00.

Applications for collecting: Thos. Coristine \$124.00; Jas. F. McNally \$119.00.

McVicar—Wallis, that John R. McVicar be appointed Assessor.—Carried.

Wilcox—McVicar, that Thos. Coristine be appointed Collector.

Amendment by Johnston—Wallies, that Jas. F. McNally be appointed Collector. Amendment carried.

Johnston—McVicar, that Gordon A. Oakes and Paul S. Kingston be appointed Auditors at a salary of \$40.00 each.—Carried.

Dr. Urie, Inwood, was appointed a member of the local Board of Health, ad John Cowan, K. C., Solicitor, retaining fee of \$30.00. By-law to be prepared confirming the Officers appointed.

Wallis—Wilcox, as recommended by the Provincial Auditor, that on and after Feb. 14th, 1925, all receipts of the Township be adopted with the Bank of Montreal, Alvinston, and payments for all accounts made therefrom be by cheques signed by the Reeve and Clerk and approved by the Board.

By-laws or resolutions inconsistent with this resolution is hereby rescinded, Feb. 14th, 1925, and Clerk notify in writing the Banks to this effect.—Carried.

Wallis—Wilcox, that Mr. John McCallum be requested to invite Mr. Todd, Road Superintendent of Yarmouth Township to address the ratepayers re expenditures on roads as approved by Department of Public Highways.—Carried.

Loosemore—Johnston, that all Statute Labor in the Township be abolished and in lieu of Statute Labor, levy such amount necessary upon the rateable assessment of the Municipality for the construction and maintenance of roads and bridges of the Township.—Carried.

By-law authorizing the abolition of Statute Labor submitted and read.

Wallis—Wilcox, that By-law be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.

Wallis—McVicar, that Wilcox be commissioner for division No. 1; Loosemore No. 2; Wallis No. 3; Johnston No. 4; McVicar No. 5.—Carried.
