believes it to be the same with chronic croup, the stridulous sound being produced by pressure on the bronchize.

Roberts; and a case of CYNNCHE LARYNG: A, in which the operation of laryngotomy, being performed after all the signs of life had ceased, breathing was restored, and the patient lived eighteen hours.
