and then take those of the Department of Defence Production. Should they be finished before Saturday evening we will go on with the estimates of trade and commerce. On Monday we intend to start with item No. 1 on today's order paper, an act to amend the Criminal Code; then item No. 7, an act to amend Prisons and Reformatories Act. Then we will take item No. 11, amendments to the Maritime Coal Production Assistance Act; then item No. 9, dealing with crop insurance; and then item No. 10, dealing with farm credit.
