#### CANADIAN COMMERCIAL RELATIONS

#### Question No. 252-Mr. Schumacher:

- 1. Was authority given by the government to Mr. Bernard Pinard, Quebec Minister of Transport to discuss commercial relations between the Soviet Union and (a) the province of Quebec (b) Canada, during his visit to Moscow at the latter part of 1972?
- 2. What (a) special (b) general authorizations are given to negotiate in the case of (i) Mr. Pinard's visit (ii) any future international such visits by provincial ministers?
- 3. What reciprocal arrangements have been made for visits by members of governments of other countries to discuss commercial relations with individual specific provinces in each case?
- Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): 1. The government of Quebec informed the federal authorities of Mr. Pinard's visit to Moscow in the company of a number of Quebec business men. Authority to discuss Canada's commercial relations with the U.S.S.R. was neither sought nor granted, since the Quebec minister was, of course, free to promote the interests of the Quebec businessmen's mission of which he was a part.
- 2. No special or general authorization was given to Mr. Pinard; nor is such normally given to provincial ministers to negotiate in these cases. Canadian commercial relations with the U.S.S.R. and other countries, in so far as they concern intergovernmental matters, are carried out by the federal government, in most cases through the duly accredited missions of both sides. This does not of course preclude the possibility that a provincial minister might be asked to carry out some function on behalf of the federal government in a specific case.
- 3. There are no reciprocal arrangements with other countries regarding discussion of commercial relations with Canadian provinces on a government to government basis. This remains a federal responsibility under the Trade and Commerce Power of the British North America Act. Provincial ministers and officials are, of course, free to discuss commercial matters with visitors from other countries.

# POST OFFICE—COAT OF ARMS OF CANADA ON POSTAL BOXES

## Question No. 272-Mr. Masniuk:

For what reason are decals of the Coat of Arms of Canada being used on postal boxes in the Confederation building instead of the metal plates normally used and (a) how many of these postal boxes have been changed in this fashion (b) on what date were they changed (c) for what reason were they changed?

Hon. André Ouellet (Postmaster General): The metal Coat of Arms on this type of box cost \$3.75 plus installation, the cost of which is hidden in the cost of manufacturing the box. The cost of the decal Coat of Arms is 19 cents and the installation cost is minimal. All postal boxes ordered by the Post Office since May 1971 carry the decal Coat of Arms. The metal Coat of Arms is no longer used since that date: (a) None of the existing boxes were changed; (b) Not applicable; (c) Not applicable.
