Lunched with Professor Martin, brother of Dr. C. F. Martin, at the Mount Royal Club where we discussed how the desire of himself and his brothers to help the University and to perpetuate their father's memory could best be fulfilled.

I suggested that help should come in the form of scholarships, surrounded by such conditions that those only would receive them who were capable of profiting thereby and to whom a university education would be denied but for such help. I suggested that some of these scholarships should be ear-marked for the sons or daughters of graduates, while others should be retained for distribution to those who were orphaned by the war. Professor Martin will communicate with me later when the proposition takes more definite shape.

Feb. 20th. Death of Sir Thomas Roddick, Governor of the University and ex-Dean of the Faculty of Medicine.

February 21st, 1923.

Dr. Joseph Nolin, Dean of the Dental Faculty of the University of Montreal, came to see me with reference to requirements demanded by the College of Dental Surgeons of the Province of Quebec, assuring me that the desire of the College was to work in harmony with McGill Dental School. He seemed to think that if we were prepared to endorse two years in Arts as a preliminary to Dentistry there would be no difficulty in meeting the wishes of the College of Dental Surgeons. He is to send me a copy of the matriculation requirements and agreed to meet Dean Laing, Dr. Thornton and myself in further conference on the matter.
