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DROUGHT IS AGAIN  
RULING CORN BELT

Prices Stiffened at Chicago in  
Consequence—Wheat  
Sold Lower.

CHICAGO, Aug. 26.—Corn prices  
rose 1/2 to 5/8 today on hot weather  
in nearly the entire corn belt. Wheat  
closed at the close, after an early show-  
ing of strength, quotations being a shade  
to 1/2 cent lower. Oats closed 3/8c  
to 1/2c off, and provisions finished a  
few points up to 1/2c down.

The chief bullish factor in corn to-  
day was renewed talk of damage by  
the heat in Nebraska. Dry, hot weather  
prevailed over almost the entire  
corn country, and the forecast was for  
a continuance of this condition for  
several days at least. September  
shuts covered freely and rising prices  
were helped also by higher cables.

The market was nervous and active  
throughout the day, and prices rallied  
quickly after each little setback fol-  
lowing profit taking. Later in the day  
the weakly Iowa crop report stiffened  
prices with its showing of large losses  
to corn in various parts of the state,  
the crop being estimated at more than  
1,000,000 bushels less than last year.

**Big Supply of Wheat.**  
Wheat weakened toward the close,  
largely on an increase of more than  
2,000,000 bushels in the world's avail-  
able supply. Another source of weak-  
ness was a falling off in speculative  
wheat demand, corn again coming in  
for the greater share of attention.

Falling off in export business also  
helped the bears and prices eased all  
around after noon, the early strength  
due to higher cables and a harden-  
ing of cash prices being counteracted.

Primary receipts today were 87,000 bush-  
els, against 1,187,000 a year ago.  
Heavy selling of near months by tired  
longs depressed provisions, tho at the  
close there was a better showing in  
land.

BUTCHER CATTLE  
WERE FIRMER

Lambs Higher—Sheep and  
Calves Firm—Hogs Were  
Lower.

Receipts of live stock at the Union  
Stock Yards were 166 cars, 2076 cattle,  
1223 hogs, 1398 sheep and lambs, and 383  
calves.

Deliveries of cattle not being as heavy  
as on Tuesday of last week trade was a  
little more active, and at the close of  
the market nearly everything was clear-  
ed up. There were many good cattle on  
sale, but more of the common and me-  
dium classes.

Prices for all desirable butchers' cattle  
and stockers were 10c higher, but the  
export steers and Montreal cattle  
were 10c to 15c lower, when compared with  
the quotations of last Tuesday's market.

Lambs were higher, sheep and calves  
firm, but hogs were lower.

Swift & Co. of Chicago bought 160 ex-  
port steers for London, 1500 lbs. each,  
at \$6.50 to \$6.85; 300 steers for Liverpool,  
1200 lbs. each, at \$6.75.

Choice butchers, \$6.40 to \$6.80, but few  
brought the latter price; good, 50c to \$6.30;  
medium, \$5.50 to \$5.80; common, \$5.20  
to \$5.40; light steers and heifers, \$4.50 to  
\$4.80; choice cows, \$5.25 to \$5.60; good  
cows, \$4.75 to \$5; medium cows, \$4 to  
\$4.75; common cows, \$3.50 to \$3.75; can-  
ners, \$2 to \$2.50; export bulls, \$5.25 to \$5.50;  
butcher bulls, \$4.25 to \$4.50; bologna, \$3.50  
to \$4.
