Just now there is a by no means small portion of the community asking themselves with a good deal of trepidation what next? Girls who have been employed on summer wear, others who have been engaged in our large stores and restaurants during the added business due to the Exhibition rush, still others who have come to this country under the impression that work and wages are to be had merely for the asking.

On the other hand many families are returning to their homes after an absence of some months. They too are asking themselves what next? The cutlook of each class, however, is entirely different. The girls are enquiring from themselves where will they next get employes. Were things better adjusted these two classes might be complementary. They might fit into one another with satisfaction to both. But the question of wages and an altogether wrong idea of relationship between the mistress of a home and those she employs to help her in its work and management, keep them apart.

What is called domestic service is perhaps the thing that comes easiest to all women. The care of a house, keeping it in order, preparing and serving the meals, nursing and attending children are all employments that come naturally to the normal woman, yet because of conditions that have gradually crept into our social system, girls and women will endure all kinds of hardships before they will do any one of these things in any house

and life and work under such conditions are a drudgery upon which none will willingly enter. If girls knew that they would have some time they might call their own, that a nice bright comfortable room was theirs in which they might recreate or work for themselves when their duty to their employer was over, and that a respectable wage was a surety in return for their labor, the domestic problem would soon be solved. Hundreds who at present turn away from the idea with distaste would fit themselves and endeavor to become exselves and endeavor to become experts in housework.





Press).—United States District Judge Learned Hand, a Progressive, and Supreme Court Justice Samuel Seabury, a Progressive Democrat, were today nominated for the chief judge and associate judge of the court of appeals, respectively, by the Progressive state committee in session here, upon recommendation of the Progressive state conference. Both are residents of New York City.

The conference heard an address by former President Roosevelt, The plea of Col. Roosevelt, that the courts of the state be "recalled" from legalism to humanity and justice, was the keynote of nominating speeches in the conference.


