## TAKING OF PHOTOS **UNDER THE WATER**

English Scientist Constructs Subaquean Chamber for That Purpose.

Dr. Fracis Ward, an English scientist, who for some time has been making a careful study of marine life, has had constructed a hamber below the level of a pond for the express purpose of investigating under-water

This chamber has large plate glass windows on the water side, and it is roofed over and entirely dark. Under these conditions the plate glass becomes a mirror and the fish and other animals in the water see in it only the reflections of themselves and their surroundings, and nothing whatever of the otserver inside. Hence the most timid fish approach the window without suspicion, and as there is ample light in the water they can easily be studied, sketched and photographed.
