To discover whether Ontario possesses that rare and valuable mineral, radium, and to reserve to the government the right of its disposal, if located in any considerable quantity, the minister of lands, forests and mines, laid a bill, before the legislature yesterday, providing a reward of \$25,000 to the man who makes the first strike in case the material or ore is found in any marketable quantity, the government reserves the right to enter upon the lands, whether located, purchased or however held, and to mine the deposit.

The bull goes further and gives to the government the right to purchase the government the right to purchase drivate lands containing radium and to regulate the sale and use of the mineral.





ECLIPSE OF MOON

Washington Astronomers to Take Advantage of It for Observation.

WASHINGTON, March 10 .- There will be an almost total eclipse of the moon tomorrow night visible from all points in Western Europe, North and South America, and Western Africa. Astronomers at the naval observatory here prepared tonight to make special observations during the eclipse, for while the moon is darkened unusually accurate work may be accomplished. Fainter stars than are normally observed for purposes of observations SS. Chiyo Maru...Saturday, Apr. 11, 1914 are more easily seen during an eclipse, it was said, and they are of great importance in correcting the lunar tables. As yet astronomers have found it impossible to compute from theory tables which agree exactly with the positions observed in the sky. The shadow of the earth will no
