## LOVERS OF DOGS ADMIRE BEAUTIES

Entries for Show at Exhibi-  
tion Are Larger Than  
Usual.

Dog-fanciers find much to satisfy  
them in this year's show at the Ex-  
hibition. The entries are larger than  
those of last year and the quality  
on the whole somewhat better. How  
widespread is the interest in the an-  
nual exhibit in Toronto is shown by  
the number of dogs from outside cen-  
tres, among which Winnipeg, Boston,  
Philadelphia and Pittsburgh may be  
enumerated.

On Labor Day the kennels and dis-  
tinct sections in which the dogs are  
housed during their stay at the Ex-  
hibition, were surrounded by a con-  
tinuous and moving throng of admir-  
ers, the large number of women car-  
ing for or showing the dogs being a  
feature.

One of the most beautiful animals  
in the fair is "Petrofka," a black and  
white Russian wolfhound, the win-  
ner of many prizes in England and  
a few of the blue ribbons here. The  
owner is Lady Watby, Ottawa.

Greyhounds are among the quietest  
tenants of the dog section, long and  
slender in contrast to the barking rest-  
less hounds about them. In the bull  
dog class there is a large choice, and  
some old campaigners in the matter  
of winning honors. "Boxton Roy,"  
owned by B. Copley, is the winner  
of no less than 31 prizes. Another  
veteran "hat" carried away the  
ribbon in many contests is "Major,"  
a fine tan-colored collie, owned by  
Mr. Geo. Newton.

"Clunker," reported by admirers as  
the best dog in Canada is a thor-  
bred Scotch dog. The owner is J. D.  
Strachan and the dog had won two  
championships before coming to  
the "Ex" this year. Of the same fam-  
ily is "Commander," who is said to  
even surpass "Clunker," having been  
pronounced by an expert as the "best  
on the continent."

"Campbell Sterling" is another spe-  
cial. Last year he was winner of  
the championship and of the 1200  
trophy cup. He is owned by Geo.  
Aschke. In the judging yesterday  
"Sweet Clover," a Boston terrier from  
the Ingomar kennels, got second prize  
and would probably have come first  
had the only had the sense to "put  
her ears up," something which her  
mistress could not coax her to do.  
In fancy dogs, a tiny Pom-ranian,  
"Bauva Petite Trix," is trying her for-  
tune for the first time. She is a very  
small chocolate brown specimen, own-  
ed by Mrs. Briggs.

Among others in view are the  
Dachshund, Great Danes, and big  
showing of white bull terriers. The  
judging is still very incomplete.

## ALL TORONTO GOES OUTDOORS MONDAY

Ideal Weather Makes Labor  
Day One of Most Pleas-  
ant Holidays.

Toronto took advantage of the fine  
weather yesterday, and spent its holi-  
day out of doors. Every available  
open space and park was crowded to  
its limit, and throngs of people, from  
early morning until late at night, the  
streets were crowded with strug-  
gling men and women carrying grips  
and bags. The largest crowd that had  
been seen for years flocked to River-  
dale Park and Withrow Park. In  
Riverdale Park alone it is estimated  
there were over 25,000 during the day,  
and the green slopes were packed with  
picnickers until long after dark. De-  
spite the fact that the Exhibition got  
the majority of the crowd, the other  
places were not forgotten, and at Scar-  
boro Beach Park, also Labor Day is  
regarded as being the worst holiday  
during the year, it is estimated that  
between eight and ten thousand peo-  
ple visited there during the day. On  
the Toronto and West End Railway,  
especially on the Metropolitan division,  
every car had to be pressed into com-  
mission, the traffic being exception-  
ally heavy, both incoming and out-  
going. Thousands flocked into the city  
bound for the Exhibition, and the out-  
going cars carried large numbers of  
people to the beach, to the lake, and  
as far north as Sutton. The  
Scarboro and Mimico divisions re-  
ported the same conditions.

The cooling breeze that blew all day  
made the water a favorite spot, and  
the largest Labor Day crowd for many  
years made the journey across the bay.  
Somewhere about 25,000 people went  
across, and while the majority made  
Hanlan's Point their object, Centre  
Island and Ward's Island were not for-  
gotten, as was evidenced by the litter  
of waste paper that carpeted practi-  
cally the whole island. The bay itself  
was thronged with all manner of  
pleasure boats, the sailing boat pre-  
dominating. A stroll around the city  
in the afternoon proved that not every-  
one had gone farther afield, and the  
person who got a seat in any of the  
downtown shows in the afternoon con-  
sidered themselves lucky. Long  
streams of patiently waiting pleasure-  
goers were to be seen outside every  
place, and many, tired of waiting,  
strolled around to the "other show" to  
see if perchance there might be a  
vacant seat there. Whatever may  
have been the attitude of the weather  
men toward the other holidays of the  
year, Labor Day 1918 was a bump-  
per, and the thousands of tired and  
weary, but nevertheless happy, citi-  
zens that made their way home late  
at night were all unanimous in the  
opinion that they had had a "great  
time."
