Dry goods payments at Montreal on the 4th hist, being for spring bills four months from April 1, were well met, and general remittances are fair to good. A number of travelers in this line are on vacation, and business is of a quiet order. The Montreal Cotton Co. advise an advance of 5 to 10 per cent. in their special makes of muslins, lavins, linings, ducks, etc. Sugars have been in particularly active request, and both local refineries are reported as being practiculty sold out of reserve stock; in general groceries the jobbing movement is a fair one. Receipts of hides are light, and the market continues very strong. Black leather timeers at a meeting held in Toronto on the 4th, established an advance of 10 per cent., and the higher prices in all lines of leather have temporarily checked demand, Business in pig iron is light, but quotations are steady on the basis of \$18,75 to \$19 for Summerice No. 1; bars are quoted at \$1.75 to \$1,80. Dairy products show some decline from the strong figures last noted; shipments last week were 78,112 boxes of cheese and 34,800 packages of butter. The variable weather has somewhat interfered with the getting in of the hay crop in first-class condition, out the yield is abundant, and geteral crops look well.

At Toronto during the week business was fair in wholesale circles. A moderate trade in drygoods continues to be done and shipments of fall and winter goods exceed those of last year. Prices of all staple lines are very firm, and domestic manufacturers are very busy. Remittances are somewhat tardy from the west, but on the movement of the crops payments will improve. Hardware and metals are fairly active, and in fast all staples are in better demand. Leather firm, and bides in demand, Hog products are also firmer, with good derand from the camps. 
