BENJAMIN BOYCOTT BRITH.

Recent Partition of Province Which

Is Too Unlikely.

Calcutta, Sept. 29.—Fifty thousand

Bengalis assembled at the Temple of

Kailash to protest against the British

Government's decision to partition the

Province of Bengal. The demonstration

elements, had grown to such unpropor-

tionable proportions as to necessitate a

division of labor, hence the partition of

the province into two administrative

resentful at what they characterize as an

attempt to split the population and im-

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LIBRARY COST PERPLEXES

PLANS MAY BE CHANGED

S. G. Curry, for Architects, Deems

\$562,000 Fair

Estimate.

As a result of the conference held

yesterday between the board of con-

trol on one hand and Librarian Bath,

City Architect McCallum and S. G. Curry

on the other, there will be a change

in going on with the competition

for new library plans. As now pro-

posed, the proposed \$250,000 would

only erect a very plain structure of the

desired size. Mr. McCallum himself

gave this opinion. Mr. Curry figured

that there would be 1,570,000 cubic feet

in the building as proposed, and at 200

a cubic foot the cost would be \$314,000.

thought advisable. It was decided to
