Also no member of the committee would vouchsafe information it is understood that after Mr. Smyth had exhibited a record of scholarship won by his pupils, and a sheaf of letters from former pupils acknowledging his capable instruction, the committee expressed themselves as satisfied with his work.

OTTAWA, Sept. 30.—(Special).—Rudyard Kipling, the famous litterateur, known to Canadians, not only by reason of "My Lady of the Snows," but because of his many notable works, passed thru Ottawa on his transcontinental train this afternoon en route to the coast.

"Anything to tell us?" was hurled at the distinguished traveler. "It is just 15 years since I was last on Canadian soil," he replied, "and I must say that I feel really happy to be back among you once more. I observed great changes in the interim."

Remarkable, was the expression of Mr. Kipling, "I noticed the change everywhere. Right up to Quebec, Canadian people all look so happy and prosperous," went on Mr. Kipling, "that it really does one good to come amongst you."

GRAIN SHIPMENTS.

Shows Big Falling Off as Compared With Last Year.

OTTAWA, Sept. 30.—(Special).—The department of trade and commerce has received from Mr. C. Castle of Winnipeg, a statement of the shipments of grain by vessels from Port William and Port Arthur from the opening of navigation to August 31, 1907, and also for the crop year, which is from Sept. 1, 1906, to Aug. 31, 1907.

From April 29 to Aug. 31 last, there was carried in Canadian vessels from these ports 20,721,617 bushels, and 1,000,000 bushels of wheat, making a total of 21,721,617 bushels of wheat.

For the corresponding period of the year 1906, Canadian vessels carried 41,719,923 bushels. There was in store on Aug. 31, 1907, 6,460,574 bushels, and on Aug. 31, 1907, 6,460,574 bushels, an increase of 5,332,556 bushels of wheat.

STRIKERS ABANDON PUMPS.

Nova Scotia Government Taking Charge of Collieries.

SPRINGFIELD, N.S., Sept. 30.—(Special).—The strike at Springfield Colliery has been on for two months, and the government of Nova Scotia has taken charge of the work heretofore done by members of the Mechanics Lodge of the P.W.A. at the colliery.

This is the consequence of a resolution of the lodge to cease work at the pumps, engines, etc., to-morrow evening. Mechanics Lodge, at a meeting held last night, decided to stop, and notice was sent to Assistant General Manager Stewart.

When Mechanics Lodge resolved to strike a letter was read from Deputy Inspector Cameron, which he instructed by the lodge that he had been instructed by the government to take charge of the work when the Mechanics abandoned it. Mr. Cameron added that there was a possibility of the company surrendering the lease.

Where the government will get men to take the place of the Mechanics, and whether it will be possible to obtain any men is a problem.
