JOHN ROBERTSON'S FAILURE

Wholesale Stationer of Montreal Deposited His List of Creditors in Court Yesterday.

LIABILITIES ARE OVER \$60,000.

Figures as to Some United States Firms Not Given—British Firms Interested.

Montreal, Aug. 28.—(Special)—John Robertson, doing business under the name of Austin & Robertson, wholesale stationers, who consented to assign some time ago to the instance of F. J. Dorken, deposited the list of his creditors in court today.

The list shows liabilities for over \$60,000, but the amount of the claims of three creditors, viz. The Old National Bank and The Michigan Trust Company, both of Grand Rapids, Mich., and the Hanover National Bank, New York, are not given.

Mr. Robertson stating that he does not know the exact amount, and reserves to himself the right to give them later. Among other creditors are: Merchants' Bank of Canada, Montreal, \$30,000; Bank of Ottawa, secured, \$500; Pirie, Wyatt & Co., Ottawa, \$287; John Moncrieff, Perth, Scotland, \$1283; Toronto Paper Co., Cornwall, Ont., \$4000; Royal Paper Mills Co., East Angus, Ont., \$2000; Munderloh & Co., \$1310; Union Bank, \$5000; American Writing Paper Co., Holyoke, Mass., \$1200; Black Clawson, Hamilton, \$6000; Dods Manufacturing Co., Chicago, \$1200; Pittsburg Bridge Company, \$1300.

BRIGANDS IN QUEBEC.

Dr. Larocque and a Companion Were Chased Nearly a Mile and Flee at.

Quebec, Aug. 28.—Dr. G. Larocque, Sergeant-at-Arms of the Legislative Assembly, had been visiting the site of the future Quebec bridge at La Chaudiere, Sunday last, in company with Rev. E. Valiquet of the Seminary of St. Therese, when, on their return home, thru the woods, two miles from St. Nomasud, they were summoned to stop by a group of brigands in hiding there.

Dr. Larocque fortunately succeeded with his companion in escaping, and distanced the assailants, but they were for nearly a mile their target, and were fired at many times. The provincial police has been charged to make search in the woods surrounding Chaudiere Falls.

ANARCHISTS DEPORTED.

Italians Charged With Plotting Against McKinley Sent Out of the United States.

New York, Aug. 28.—The Italian named Gelsa, who arrived in this country two weeks ago, in company with the alleged anarchist, Marocco, another Italian, was today, on instructions from the Treasury Department, ordered excluded from this country and deported to Europe.

The men were charged with being parties to a plot to kill President McKinley.

MINERS' STRIKE THREATENED.

If the Operators Are Stubborn There Will Be Trouble Among the Anthracite Diggers.

Hazleton, Pa., Aug. 28.—If the anthracite coal operators refuse to grant the demands of the United Mine Workers, as embodied in the report of the Scale and Resolutions Committee, as presented and adopted at the convention, within 10 days of date, or by Sept. 5, a strike, it is said, will be declared.

London, Aug. 28.—Mr. George Trevelyan, British Minister, resident at Bangkok since 1894, has been appointed British Minister to Mexico in succession to Sir Henry Irving, recently appointed British Minister at Rio Janeiro.

Waukegan, Ill., Aug. 28.—Mrs. Dr. Wright, brought here from Gilman, Ill., yesterday, has died of the effects of her wounds received in the attack on her house last Sunday.
