

SELLERS TAKE THE BATTLESHIP AS A BARGAIN

Kniaz Potemkin in Hands of Mutineers, with Captain and Officers Murdered—Fights the Red Flag and Will Fight the Black Sea Fleet.

Odessa, June 28.—The red flag of revolution is hoisted on the masts of the Kniaz Potemkin, Russia's most powerful battleship in the Black sea, which now lies in the harbor in hands of mutineers.

The main squadron of the Black Sea fleet, consisting of the battleships Georgei, Rostislav, and Iskra, are completely in the possession of the crew and a mutiny has broken out in their lot with the mutineers.

The mutiny arose from the shooting of a sailor who was presenting on behalf of the crew, on Monday, as usual, a petition to the captain.

During the day a red flag was hoisted on the Kniaz Potemkin and members of the crew roved from ship to ship in the harbor, stopping all work thereon.

St. Petersburg, June 28.—The news of the mutiny coming when Poland is in a state of ferment, has excited the government into attempting a mobilization involving a crisis, and the authorities are endeavoring to keep it from the public eye.

WORK RADIAL ON YONGE ST. MUST YIELD CONCESSIONS

In Order to Secure Double Track Privileges—Straight Business Settlement Will Be Demanded.

A prominent resident up Yonge-street who is also a large property holder in the city, and who evidently is conversant with the whole situation, called on The World yesterday in regard to radial extensions on Yonge-street.

He said, in substance, that the time had come when the whole question of electric traction on Yonge-street by the York radial railway, and the entrance of radial cars into the city ought to be settled.

The basis of the settlement should cover the following points: 1. The radial would have to surrender its perpetual franchise on Yonge-street to the municipalities.
