The City Fathers

Transact a Good Deal of Important Business.

Dr. Gardiner Presents His Views on the Sewerage Question.

The Fair Board Wish to Charge for Use of Grand Stands.

London Trust Affairs Wound Up - The Last of the Watering Carts - New Hydrants Wanted.

The City Council had an amicable session last night and transacted a good deal of business without any violent eruptions.

Early in the evening a deputation from the Western Fair Board, consisting of W. J. Reid, J. S. Pearce and Secretary Browne, waited on the aldermen.

Dr. Gardiner presented his views on the sewerage question, and the aldermen, after a short discussion, decided to refer the matter to the Finance Committee.

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mittee's report. The first clause canceled the project of paving the Market Lane. Carried.

The second recommended that the petition of John Price, et al, to have a part of Wellington street graded, be referred to next year's council, and that the engineer put the street in a safe condition at the lowest possible cost. Carried.

The third clause read the petition of H. Simpson, et al, complaining that their property on Rectory street was flooded.

Ald. Dreaney and Ald. Nutkins advocated some redress for the petitioners, but several aldermen contended that the petition was too late, and that the owners had built on it, knowing its drawbacks. The clause carried. Ald. Dreaney and Nutkins voting nay.

THE FINANCE COMMITTEE. Apart from the accounts, No. 1 committee's report was brief. The clause was adopted, which asked that the committee be empowered to call for tenders for the G. T. R. car shops.

THE MISSING CARTS. Ald. Pritchard reported for the special committee on the missing watering carts. The gist of it was that some parts of the carts had been used to repair other carts, and some were in the central area, but the balance of the carts, and principal gearings could not be accounted for.

Ald. Pritchard urged the adoption of his report and then made a few remarks. He charged that the engineer had not been called to further investigate the water on the investigation, by pretending that those carts were not in existence.

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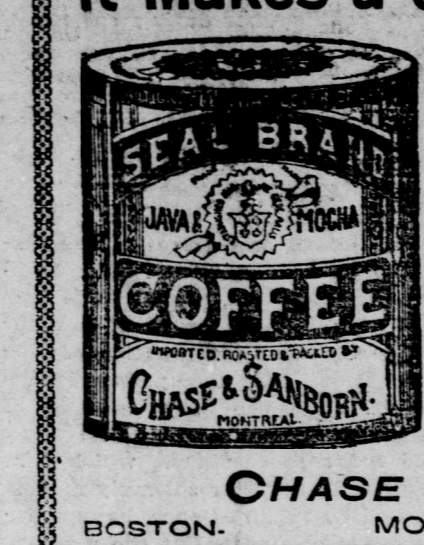
