A Noted Murder Case.

Michael Brennan, who murdered Mr. Strathy, banker, Barrie, in that town a year ago, was today found guilty and sentenced to be hanged. The prisoner was tried and found guilty on the charge at a previous assize, but a new trial was granted because of misdirection, and in this second trial it seemed as if the prisoner would get clear, as last night the jurors came into court with the statement that they could not agree. After being locked up all night, a unanimous verdict of guilty was reached, and the prisoner was sentenced to be hanged.

The defense had two branches-(1), that the prisoner was insane when he committed the deed; and, (2), that the killing arose from an altercation; and was therefore manslaughter. Dr. Daniel Clark, of the Toronto Asylum, for the Insane, who was called for the defense, supported the theory that Brennan might have been insane from ill-founded jealousy, but that even in that condition he could know that he was committing the deed.

In cases of murder, if punishment is to act as a deterrent on others, fine discriminations as to maniaes cannot be permitted. The question for a jury to decide is whether or not the murderer knew that he was committing the crime. If he did know, hypothetical excuses for the deed should not

SIGNIFICANT MOVES.

Paris, Oct. 30 .- A dispatch from St. Petersburg to the Soleil says that there has been an important exchange of views between the French and Russian Ministers of War, by which certain modifications have been effected in the general plan for the mobilization and concentration of Franco-Russian troops in time of war. The Soleil adds that proof of this statement will soon be seen in a number of frontier changes, and the first step is said to have already been taken by an increase in the number of Russian dragoons.

LORD DUFFERIN'S RETIREMENT. London, Oct. 30 .- The Marquis of Dufferin, newly retired from the post of British ambassador at Paris, was accorded a banquet at Belfast, at which he made a speech. He declared that owing to his age and deafness he had definitely retired from official life. Although England was not loved, the Marquis continued, she had no diswith any nation of Europe except Turkey. The salvation of the Armenians, he asserted, cannot be ound in any scheme applied to the Armenians alone, but in reforms giving protection to all Turkish sub-The Marquis also expressed the hope that the United States and England would be the first to practically apply the principle of arbitration to the settlement of international disputes. Lord Dufferin said that every Englisman's soul would revolt in horror at the thought of any fra tricidal collision with the United States, which could only result in involving the United States and them in a common ruin.

BISMARCK'S ORGAN

Reasserts Its Statements Regarding Secret Russo-German Alliance.

Berlin, Oct. 30,-The Hamburger Nachrichten, Bismarck's organ, denies that the interview published in the Neue Freie Presse, of Vienna, on October 25 was with Prince Bismarck, as per furthermore confirms the assertion that the secret Russo-German nal last week, was not renewed in 1890, owing to the outbreak of the Chancellor crisis, which resulted in Prince Bismarck's retirement, and to the opposition to the treaty of General von Caprivi, Prince Bismarck's successor in the Chancellorship. The official Austrian organs are still

The Neue Freie Presse, however, says that a written treaty or agreement between Russia and Germany actually existed without the knowledge of the other powers. This agreement was signed in 1884, and for six years pledged the parties to benevolent neutrality in the event that either was attacked without provocation. If Russia attacked Austria, latter was to have the support of Germany; but if Austria provoked Russia, Germany was to remain neu-This agreement covered Germany in the direction of Austria as well as in the direction of Russia, and, moreover, Germany was fully protected against France. The Jury in the Case Locked Up All Night.

Michael Brennan Found Guilty of Murder.

And Sentenced to be Hanged on the 19th of January. Barrie, Oct. 30 .- The Brennan trial

opened yesterday, with the examination of the prisoner's brother, John J. Brennan, who gave a history of his dealings with Michael, while the Jas. Woods. latter was laboring under the belief of his wife's infidelity. Mr. Johnston's cross-examination shattered considerably the contention of the defense that the prisoner is insane. The same may be said of the evidence of

Agnes and May. DR. CLARK'S EVIDENCE.

Dr. Daniel Clark, of Toronto, stated that from the evidence of the trial and assuming it to be true he thought that the prisoner is a victim of delusionary insanity, called paranoi, which manifests itself in personal persecution, egotism and jealousy. of this disease become homicidal, and often attempt to punish those whom they think the cause of their troubles, particularly jealousy, the strongest of all passions, intensified in the insane. The evidence of one witness went to show that the prisoner had auditory hallucinations which Clark said he never met among the sane, but always among the insane. though some persons have hallucinations of the other senses. of delusional insanity may be rational and sane on other matters, hence may in Toronto Asylum, inmates are capable of pursuing intelligently various lines of trade. He believed the prisoner was quite able to understand the nature of the murder, but the insane know this. In respect to quality of the act, viz., the breaking of the law, he knew what he was doing, that is, he had intellectual appreciation of what he was doing. Nevertheless, he might believe he was doing right in killing a man whom he onsidered had wronged him. It was a mere intellectual act with the prisoner, not a moral act. Cross-examined by the crown, he had said that a man might have the delusion of controlled his delusion.

Clinton, Oct. 30.-The convention of Huron Lay Workers and Sunday School Teachers was brought to a close yesterday.
