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THAT 8-HOUR DAY IS BONE OF CONTENTION

L. and P. S. Men Are Not Yet
Satisfied.

ANOTHER CONFERENCE

Commission and Employees To
Meet and Discuss Their
Differences.

That eight-hour day, which the rate-payers of Hamilton had been assured was granted the London and Port Stanley employees is apparently one of the bones of contention between the men and the commission at present. Wages and general working conditions are other questions which will be discussed at a conference between representatives of the two parties, probably at the end of this week. A meeting would have been called sooner had it not been for the fact that Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the commission, was away. It is expected that he will be in the city on Saturday.

While it is anticipated that a satisfactory agreement will be reached, the men are determined that the commission will have to give better terms and conditions than have been proposed. The men are also not too willing to give out any information, but it is gathered that unless the commission is willing to meet the demands of the men some means of forcing the issue will be taken. It is confidently expected that something definite will be decided at the conference, which will probably be held on Saturday.

What means the men will take in the event the commission does not offer better conditions has not been considered, according to reports. The strike is considered as being a remote possibility, but it would be considered at all. The men say they are determined to secure better conditions, and they are confident of success.

Twenty-Six Years

Clerk in London

John Moule Has Worked
Under Three Different
Magistrates.

Succeeding John M. Kearney as police court clerk at the Carling street police headquarters in 1893, John Moule, is completing twenty-six years as clerk there as custodian of the court.

PAYS FINE OF \$250

Conrad Schneider Thought He
Wasn't "Treated Right."

Conrad Schneider, for failing to report for military service when called, was fined \$250 and costs today by Police Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon in the Carling street court.

"I thought I wasn't treated right," was the exoner's excuse for failing to report on December 23, 1918.

"Six months or \$250 and costs," retorted the magistrate, adding: "I cannot see how you, once a government soldier, could make such a report."

"I'll pay the fine," answered Schneider, as he produced a lot of yellow checks, and commenced handing Court Clerk John Moule the necessary amount. He insisted that the letter give him an acknowledgment of the money paid into the court coffers.

MEMORIAL FOR M. P.
KILLED IN ACTION

Ottawa, May 2.—A memorial in the new parliament buildings for Col. G. H. Baker, the only member of the Canadian House to be killed in the war, was proposed to the Senate last night by Senator Foster. A committee was appointed to prepare the memorial, and the committee is taking a greater interest in this movement than in any other that has arisen during his period of office in Canada. He will be present at the conference and take part in the discussions.

What is considered the most important national movement, the Rotary Clubs of Canada have endorsed and supported is the movement that will culminate in the all-Canadian educational conference to be held in Winnipeg in August next. The London Rotary Club has pledged itself to raise \$2,000, while Montreal, Winnipeg, Victoria, Regina, Moose Jaw have promised to raise sums ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

The conference will be addressed by the leading educators of the English-speaking world. Sir Michael Saship, vice-chancellor of the University of Leeds, will represent Great Britain, and Dr. Claxton, head of the American National Bureau of Education, at the personal request of President Woodrow Wilson, will speak for the United States. Among the Canadian speakers will be Dr. George H. Leckie of Toronto, who recently addressed the Rotary Club of London. His Excellency the Governor-General is taking a greater interest in this movement than in any other that has arisen during his period of office in Canada. He will be present at the conference and take part in the discussions.

Fine Program.
The program of the meetings includes such subjects as "The Essentials of Education," "Character in Its Relation to Citizenship," "Training the Immigrant in Citizenship," "Citizenship and International Relations," "Formal Instruction in Citizenship and Ethics." The specific purpose of the conference is to determine some means of utilizing the school systems already established in the various provinces for instructing all the children of the Dominion in one uniform type of citizenship. The Germans have shown the world how to use a school system to develop a single ideal of citizenship, but, as happens, that ideal was proved to be selfish and vicious. It is now thought incumbent upon Canadians to define an unselfish and noble type of citizenship, and then to endeavor to give instruction in it to the young of the land along with instruction in the branches of study now regularly prescribed in the schools.
