Among the Canadian speakers will be Dr. George H. Locke of Toronto, who recently addressed the Rotary Club of London. His Excellency the Governor-General, is taking a greater interest in this movement than in any other that has arisen during his period of office in Canada. He will be present at the conference and take part in the discussions.

The program of the meetings includes such subjects as "The Essentials of Education," "Character in Its Relation to Citizenship," "Training the Immigrant in Citizenship," "Citizenship and International Relations," "Formal Instruction in Citizenship and Ethics." The specific purpose of the conference is to determine some means of utilizing the school systems already established in the various provinces for instructing all the children of the Dominion in one uniform type of citizenship. 
