Chicago Manager Longs For Old-Time Ways.

Chicago, Jan. 18.—Revival of the old-time baseball players' bus for trips to and from the ballpark would give far toward restoring simplicity and the spirit of sportsmanship to the game, Manager Johnny Evers of the Cubs declared today.

"The old bus gave a good wholesome advertising, but at the same time it put real fun, chance for real team work and more honest-to-goodness pep in the game," Evers declared. "It made it more like a sport and less like a commercial proposition."

"Remember how the manager and his team used to pile out of the hotel and into the bus? If we were the visiting team the town was there to see and cheer at us. Away we would go across the town, the entire route one long line of yelling home town boosters. By the time the park was reached everyone had heard something that made him full of fight."

"After the game we would pile back into the bus. A couple of thousand fans would stand around the bus, cheering and waving. We got it coming and going, and loved it."

"How is it today? Morning practice makes the front of the park look like an automobile show. The players are too busy keeping dates with everybody in the world, from movie stars to soap manufacturers, to have time to go to the ballpark."

"The season was the result of a few years ago. They don't spend enough time learning baseball."

ECONOMY IS WATCHWORD.

SARNIA, Jan. 17.—With Mayor Crawford in the chair the council and heads of the various city departments met in the city hall tonight in an effort to stop financial leaks throughout the city. The session was the result of the activity of Ald. Thomas Cook, and following the announcement of Mayor Crawford in his inaugural speech, every effort is being made to curtail the city's expense during the year. It was stated, following the meeting, that the city will spend very little money during the year, and that money will be spent only for work that is absolutely necessary.

BODY OF DUCHESS OLGA ON STEAMER

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Bodies supposed to be those of Grand Duchess Olga of Russia, and her maid are aboard the British steamer Devanha, which is due to reach Egypt at the end of the present week. Disinterred at Yekaterinburg, the bodies are said to have been through Persia and thence to Shanghai.

Upon the arrival of the steamer they will be disembarked and taken to the Holy Land for final interment.

WILL TRANSFER RACING STABLE FROM FRANCE TO THE UNITED STATES

New York, Jan. 18.—A large part of the noted French racing stable of the late William K. Vanderbilt will be brought to the United States this year. A. K. Macomber, the California horseman, announced here today. Mr. Macomber acquired the stable last September at a price reported at about \$100,000.

Among thirty-six horses to be shipped to the United States are the two famed breeding stallions, Seaside and Over-night, which during their racing life won \$125,000 each; eight horses in training, and more than a score of yearlings.
