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

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HAMILTON RADIAL BILL AGAIN BUMPS THE BUMPS

Claude Macdonell Sends Telegram Out of Snowdrift to Stop Performance Till He is Dug Out.

OTTAWA, March 2.—(Special.)—When the house went into committee on the bill of the Hamilton Radial Electric Railway Co. Dr. Sproule read a telegram from Claude Macdonell, who was snowbound at Brockville, asking that the bill be laid over, as he had some amendments to submit.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier pointed out that this was the third Monday that the bill had been on the order paper.

Mr. Cocksbutt (Brantford) objected to the clause prohibiting the sale or distribution of power within the limits of any city which owns and operates its own electric lighting or power plant, without consent expressed by private individuals owning coal or timber lands. It was not wise to create a giant monopoly of this kind, thought Mr. Foster.

Mr. Clarke (Strathcona) said this bill was modeled on the lines of other bills passed by the house.

Mr. Cocksbutt enquired what bills contained such wide powers, and was told that the Grand Trunk Pacific did.

The bill to incorporate the Saskatchewan, Saskatchewan, Peace River and Dawson Railway Co. was taken up in committee.

It is proposed to permit the railway to own coal lands and timber lands and operate pulp mills. Mr. Foster pointed out that this was giving the company a tremendous advantage over private individuals owning coal or timber lands. It was not wise to create a giant monopoly of this kind, thought Mr. Foster.
