**WEST TORONTO WILL BE WARD SEVEN**

Western Suburb Scores on Contentious Point—Looks Like a Go, This Time.

Many of the difficulties hitherto standing in the way of union between West Toronto and the city were yesterday happily removed at a special conference between Mayor Baird and Solicitor A. J. Anderson, representing West Toronto and Mayor Oliver and the board of control for the city.

As far as those vested with the preliminary conditions can say, the matter, nothing now stands in the way of a speedy and happy consummation of the plan, but two difficulties yet remain to be overcome, and these were tersely expressed by Mayor Baird.

“Before we go to Queen's Park,” said the mayor, “for ratification, we will take a vote on the matter in West Toronto, and I expect it will carry, but not unanimously.”

In the matter was agreed to make it that West Toronto should constitute a separate ward, to be known as ward seven.

Respecting the taking over of the police force, Mayor Oliver refused to accede to the West Toronto representation to take the entire force.

“There is one man we don't want,” said Mayor Oliver, “and we can't take him back on our force.”

Mayor Baird made a strong appeal, but without avail.

“Employ him in some other capacity,” said Controller Spence.

This was agreed to, and Constable Lavery will not be on the city police force.

Local option continues in force until repealed by a popular vote of the district.

The salaries of West Toronto officials will be no lower.

The school teachers now in West Toronto will be taken over, as will those of Harris, the secretary, will be retained, but council are admittedly powerless in this regard. The board of education assuming jurisdiction.

Ward seven will not be a fire district, but some re-arrangement will be made. No new separate police station will be created.

There will also be a re-arrangement for the holding of more than a central police court.

**FOOLED BY PETITION FOR FIXED ASSESSMENT**

**Wychwood Residents Who Favor Annexation Misled by Opponents of Scheme.**

“With the Electrical Development Company opposing annexation, Captain Allan Royce of the Suburban Railway drawing up petitions to knock it, and H. J. Fleming attacking the boundary line because, he says, it struck his house, it looks to the people of the Wychwood district as if there was a bunch with their heads together trying to keep this district out of the city for some reason that shall be of great importance to the City of Toronto in the future.”

These are the significant suspicions voiced by H. J. Baker, 204 Spadina road, last night. Continuing, he said:

“As one of the many persons deeply interested in the annexation of Wychwood, I would like to enlighten Mr. Rust somewhat as to the feelings of the people in this district, on the annexation movement and the city water question.”

“As far as his statement about the people being opposed to annexation goes, it is wrong. Fully 99 per cent. of the resident owners of this district are strongly in favor of annexation, and enough were posted by a petition for a fixed assessment for ten years that was used, to knock the original petition.”

“I know these facts to be true, because I interviewed at least 60 of the 91 who signed this petition.”

“All said they never expected it to be used against annexation and signed a document to that effect, but the Railway Board would not allow us the privilege of proving to them that this matter had been secured by their misrepresentation, by giving us an advertisement to call these people before them.”

“Now, Mr. Rust says he would not give us people, who have worked at this matter for the past four years, city privileges; but he has already granted these privileges to the people who are our strongest opponents.”

“Give the people who have fought for annexation the privileges, and cut the throats who have fought against it (for they already have these privileges of water and drainage), and there would soon be something doing in Wychwood in the way of annexation.”

“Our strongest opponents have water and sewage facilities, and could not do without them. There is a 6-inch water main from the high level pumping station along the Davenport road to away over past Bathurst street.”

“This main supplies such people on the hill with water, measured out to them by metre. Between that main and the city there is a solid block of people, all of whom are in favor of annexation, but cannot touch that main.”

“Even if they would lay a main down that street at their own expense, they would have to run a main from Davenport street, which means about 400 feet before you get up to the homes, and would necessitate tunneling under the C.P.R. property.”

“I think it is time the city fathers woke up to some of the facts of the case.”

“Under the present law it is simply impossible to become annexed to the city with an opposition such as we have to fight.”

**BOARD ENDORSE IT.**

Will Resist Any Attempt to Secure Repeal of Local Option.

At the regular quarterly meeting of the official board of the Richmond Hill Methodist Church, this resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved that as the quarterly board of the Richmond Hill Circuit have observed with satisfaction the moral character and high standing of the members of the Richmond Hill Township and Vaughan Township, they also deplore any effort made to repeal such law.
