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TOWN OF NORTH TORONTO

Court of Revision Re Local Improvements.

TAKE NOTICE that the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of North Toronto intend to construct the following local improvement works on certain streets within the limits hereinafter set forth and assessed, to-wit: to-wit:

(A) A concrete sidewalk (4 feet in width) with necessary grading, upon and along the easterly side of Gordon-street, from a connection with the southerly limit of Eglinton-avenue East, southerly along the easterly side of said Gordon-street to a connection with the southerly limit of Glendon-avenue, a distance of 338 feet, more or less.

(B) A concrete sidewalk (4 feet in width) with necessary grading, upon and along the easterly side of Douglas-avenue, from a connection with the southerly limit of Eglinton-avenue East, southerly along the easterly side of said Douglas-avenue to a connection with the southerly limit of Glendon-avenue, a distance of 338 feet, more or less.

(C) A concrete sidewalk (4 feet in width) with necessary grading, upon and along the easterly side of said Douglas-avenue, from a connection with the southerly limit of Eglinton-avenue East, southerly along the easterly side of said Douglas-avenue to a connection with the southerly limit of Glendon-avenue, a distance of 338 feet, more or less.

(D) A concrete sidewalk (4 feet in width) with necessary grading, upon and along the easterly side of Yonge-street, from a point where the easterly limit of said Douglas-avenue intersects with the southerly limit of Eglinton-avenue East, southerly along the easterly side of Yonge-street to a connection with the southerly limit of Glendon-avenue, a distance of 338 feet, more or less.

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
