Official War Statements

British. The British official communication of last night says: "Our aeroplanes yesterday made a successful bombing raid against the aerodrome near Lille, all the machines returning safely to base."

"Today the enemy exploded a mine near Fricourt. There were no casualties. Our artillery has been active against enemy trenches about the Ypres-Comines canal and east of Boesinghe."

French. The French statement of yesterday afternoon follows: "To the east of Valenciennes we have launched fresh attacks on the enemy works in the region of the forest of Chetty. Intermittent artillery activity has been carried out between Malinvaux and the left bank of the Meuse."

"In the district to the north of Verdun the cannonade has diminished in violence and the enemy made no attack on our positions during the night."

"We have established organized positions in the rear of Beaumont on the heights stretching from the east of Champeville and to the south of Ornes."

"The night was calm on the remainder of the front."

German. The German official statement of yesterday follows: "On the right bank of the River Meuse our successes previously reported were exploited yesterday in different directions. The fortified villages and farms of Champ Neuville, Cottelot, Marmont, Beaumont, Chambrettes and Ornes were captured."

"In addition, all the enemy's positions as far as the ridge of Loudefont were captured. The enemy losses were extraordinarily heavy, while our losses were normal. The number of prisoners taken was increased by over 7000 to more than 10,000."

"No information can yet be given with regard to the booty in materials which we captured in the Balkan theatres. There is nothing to report."

Austrian. An Austrian official report issued today says: In Albania yesterday we de-

feated Italians and troops of Essad Pasha, near Durazzo, and took possession of the last of enemy positions east of Bazar Sza. An Italian brigade was driven from its main position east of Bazar Sza at the same time.

"Entrenchments of the enemy at Saabianco, six miles southeast of Durazzo, were stormed. The enemy is retreating to inner line of defences, pursued by our troops."

The Austro-Hungarian official statement says: "In consequence of our hard prosecution of the Italians east and south-east of Durazzo, they have been driven to the isthmus west of the Dura Lakes. The Durazzo docks are under the fire of the Austro-Hungarian batteries and the embarkation of men and war materials have been efficiently hindered."

"Up to the present in these combats eleven Italian officers and over 700 soldiers have been made prisoner, and five cannon and one machine gun captured."

Turkish. The Turkish official statement of yesterday says: "Mesopotamian front: An enemy detachment of about one battalion attempted to approach our positions near Felahia, but was compelled by our fire to retreat, leaving numerous dead. Among those who fell during the last battle at Felahia were 7 British officers. Recently we took prisoner 17 soldiers of the enemy troops, who in the course of battle fled into the surrounding country."

"Caucasus front: Battles continue without interruption. "Dardanelles front: Some enemy bombers have been driven from time to time between Feb. 18 and 22 the beaches near Seddul-Bahr and Teke-Burru, without result. Our batteries near Gumkani and Seddul-Bahr forced them to retreat without their being able to continue to fire for any considerable time."

"Enemy aeroplanes recently flew over the Dardanelles, but were driven off and pursued by our battle aeroplanes."

"On Feb. 20 an enemy cruiser under protection of mine sweepers penetrated the Gulf of Saros, supported by three enemy observation aeroplanes. The enemy bombers without success attacked our coast near Galata and Gallipoli (on the Gallipoli Strait). One of our battle aeroplanes drove off the enemy aircraft, whereupon the cruiser ceased fire and departed with the mine sweepers."
