Good mediums sold at \$2.75 to \$3.25; ordinary mediums, at \$2 to \$2.50; and common to \$1.50 to \$2.

WHERE LAMBERGER IS MADE

Only Three Factories in the Dominion Turning Out Toothsome But Odoriferous Cheese.

Preston, Aug. 28.—Special.—The good old County of Waterloo, the most prosperous manufacturing and agricultural county in Ontario, is the home of an industry that flourishes alone within its borders, namely, the manufacture of limburger cheese.

The towns of the county each have possessions that are contributing to their prosperity and advancement, as well as advertising their respective fame abroad. Berlin has its sugar refinery and varied industries, Waterloo Seagram's string of racers and the distillery where the famous Gait springs into existence; Gait has its great iron works, Preston its mineral springs, and the towns of Berlin, Waterloo and Seagram have their woolen mills, and last, but not least, Baden, its limburger cheese factory.

It was for the purpose of ascertaining how this famous and odoriferous cheese is made that a World reporter drove over to the picturesque little village of Baden one afternoon recently. The reporter in haste to get to the tall smoke stack that might possibly indicate the existence of the works, and finally stopped, native with the realization, "Can you tell me, sir, where the limburger cheese factory is located?"

The man, while he did not "have a mustache like Kaiser," gave evidence of his "fustian" in his reply: "You shud go down dot lane vier dot house is vot was burnt down."

The milk on its arrival is poured into a vat and heated to 100 degrees Fahrenheit, and temperature it is maintained for an hour. A small amount of rennet is added to the milk, and the curd is separated, the percentage of whey being 90 per cent to the remaining 10 per cent. The curd is then poured into long moulds and is left to harden for half an hour, after which it is pressed into cakes.
