## **Balkan Situation May Reach Crisis** Within The Next Twenty-Four Hours

## Decision Still Rests on At-Cholera In titude of Bulgaria

Special Meetings of Roumanian Cabinet Soldier on Leave From and Serbian and Grecian Parliaments -Bulgaria Recalls Envoy to Turkey-Roumania May Solve Deadlock by Sudden Move

The Serbian Skupshtina (National Assembly), will reassemble at Nish to-day, to receive a statement from Premier Pachitch, on the Bulgarian negotia-tions. Simultaneously the Greek parliament will meet at Athens to oust the present cabinet, with the supporters of former Premier Veniselos, as powerful as

The analysists of the morning papers, point out that Austria meanwhile is gathering troops on the Danube and that German writers are advocating openly, an advance to the Aegean Sea.

The Daily News says editorially, that Roumania may make a sudden move which will solve the Balkan deadlock.

"The force of events," the paper says, "may cut the knots at which diplomatic fingers have been picking in vain. Decisive action by Roumania would mean that she had obtained assurances from Bulgaria's attitude which is the great danger point. Thus we are driven back always to a rift between the Bul-"The article closes with an impas-sioned appeal to Serbia to yield concessions sought by Bulgaria.

NEGOTIATIONS WITH TURKEY OFF

London, Aug. 116—So much importance is attached to the results expected from the proposals made by the entente powers, to Serbia and Greece regarding concessions to Bulgaria, that Bulgaria has recalled from Constantinople a delegate who went there to negotiate with Turkey, says a despatch from Sofia, to the Daily Mail.

London, Aug. 16—An Athens despatch to the Daily Telegraph says:
"At a recent meeting of the Young Turks, the question of a regency was discussed on the ground that Sultan Mohamed V., is far from well, and incap-

able of attending to affairs of state.

"The situation is too complicated by the knowledge that Crown Prince Yussof Izzedin, is lukewarm in his attitude towards the war. In the hope of convincing the Crown Prince, that all is going well, party leaders recently psr-suaded him to pay a personal visit to the Dardanelles, front." GOOD WORK BY THE SERBIANS

Paris, Aug. 16—A Havas despatch from Nish, dated Sunday, says that on August 13 the Serbians, with a few shells, stopped the enemy from working on defenses in front of the village of Dobra on the Danube. On the same day Serbian artillery before Velicocolo near Belgrade, engaged in a duel with a hostile battery, stationed at the village of Starchevo and at the twelfth shot, reduced the enemy's guns which had fired sixty shells to silence.

The parliaments of Serbia and Greece meet today and important developments in the Balkan situation are expected. Capitals of the entente allies hope for a speedy agreement among the Balkan powers, by which their concerted aid

Observers of the trend of diplomatic interchanges recognize many difficul-ties in view of the reluctance of Serbia and Greece to grant the territorial
