Willard Offered \$45,000. The Garden A. C. of New York has made an offer of \$45,000 to Jess Willard for three fights this season. It hopes to match the champion against Frank Moran, Gunboat Smith and the winner of the Jack Dillon-Charlie Wetner bout in the order named. Willard has not yet answered. He has been reaping a golden harvest with the 101 Ranch Company.

Chance for Moran. Frank Moran will be selected to meet Jess Willard in a ten-round bout at the Brighton Beach Motorrome on the afternoon of Memorial Day. Jack Curley, one of Willard's managers, said that he is ready to stage a contest, and that if Moran is really anxious to go against the champion he will give him a guarantee of \$10,000 and an additional \$1,000 for training expenses.

News of the Beers. Willie Ritchie, who has found out that he can no longer get to lightweight title, but he did not get far, for Ted Lewis, the English boxer, who is willing to box even 150-pound men, has hurled a challenge at him for \$5,000 a side. The Englishman has posted a forfeit and offers to box on a winner-take-all basis over the twenty-round route. Lewis would like the bout to be held in New Orleans, where they can box twenty rounds to a decision.

The followers of the game in Portland, Me., are going to have a chance to see some fine boxing this winter. The Eastern A. C., which will stage the bouts, has made plans to get good talent. Joe Mandolo, who is back in New Orleans, to take a rest, has been offered \$1,200 to box Frankie Russell in that city. Lesch Cross has confessed to being worth \$100,000.

Bleacher Seats "Going Up." St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 4.—The ten cent bleacher seat will be abolished at the St. Louis Federal League park next season. It was tried the last month of the season just ended, and proved a success so far as drawing crowds was concerned. The officials, however, have concluded that it is not a paying proposition, and that the local team will draw as well without it, especially playing good ball as it did the latter part of the season. The price will be increased to either twenty or twenty five cents. The five cents and general admission will be fifty cents, with possibly three rows of reserved seats at seventy five cents.

Christy Mathewson writes as follows to an American sporting paper: "This is going to be a busy winter in baseball. There will be many trades. THE DOWNFALL OF CARSON

A New Reading of the Situation in British Government—The "Whimpering" Northcliffe Newspapers

(Special Cable to the Montreal Gazette) London, Nov. 8.—Premier Asquith's speech in the House of Commons has brought about triangular arguments of personalities which promises diverting developments. Sir Edward Carson and Lord Northcliffe complete the trio, in which the prime minister figures as undoubtedly the most happy in securing the confidence of his countrymen. Sir Edward, who since his resignation from the cabinet has been painted

by his friends as the strong, silent man for whom the nation has been looking to control its destinies, made a clear bid for the post which is jocosely spoken of as "the leadership of the opposition" in the house where there is no regularly constituted anti-government party. His speech at first was listened to sympathetically, it ended in bewildering the house. He taxed the cabinet with having no plan to deal with the Balkan situation. Members openly thanked Heaven that the government had refused to have anything to do with Carson's plan which amounted to little more than the coercion of Greece. John Redmond neatly hit off the situation when he asked Premier Asquith if he was not sorry for his failure to follow Mr. Redmond's advice not to include any Irish leader in the coalition cabinet. Sir Edward Grey completed the rout of Carson by pointing out that the latter had completely misunderstood certain phases of the international situation. Mr. Asquith's speech yesterday was a reply to the Daily Mail's writes Lord Northcliffe in that paper today. The Westminster Gazette comments that "There happened to be a thunder-clap just when the frog had come to the top of his pond and now his morning croak. It's answering me" he said and croaked again to the bursting point. He's answering me," say the professional whippersnappers this morning in dealing with the prime minister's speech and proceeded to fresh exercises in self-indulgence and boasting vanity which if any of these readers had a glint of humor left alone a sense of propriety, would disclose the whole whimpering business in ridicule."

NICKNAME "BOSCHES" ENRAGES HUNS (London Daily Mail) As "Bosches" the Germans will go down the ages in perfect disgrace. In their overseas dominions, those who bow the knee to the Kaiser will be known as Boschies and Boschies alone. As a term of reproach the term would not be improved. It is short and contemptuous, and its meaning is so vague, so thickly wrapped in mystery, that it may be made a pack-saddle upon whose back we load all the shame and ignominy of a thousand evil deeds. The Boschies themselves are not pleased with the name found for them by their enemies. The Yostische Zeitung complains that it is "a word taken from the most disgusting jargon of dens of vice,"
