Houses For The Workers

(Halifax Echo.) It is indeed an ill wind that blows nobody good. The people of Boston, taking advantage of the general depression, caused by the war, are constructing model suburbs for workers, at a fraction of the cost that such work entails in more prosperous times. In this way they are killing several birds with the one stone. They are creating work for men who otherwise would be unemployed and in many cases a burden upon the community, they are providing the workers with houses more adapted to their needs and they are rendering less acute the housing problem, incidental to life in a large city.

The object of the movement is to provide the workers with ideal houses renting from \$5 to \$20 per month. The type of house adhered to by one organization (what is known as a quadruple house). These quadruple houses, intended for workmen in suburban Boston, have living rooms, 15x9 feet, with dining rooms almost as large, and kitchens on the first floor, and on the second floor a large and one small bedroom each, with dress closets, linen closet and bath.

The quadruple house, which have already been worked in Philadelphia, save on their common interior walls as well as on the whole character of the building operation. The six-family houses—of which ten are now in process of construction—have in addition by the use of stock sizes and wholesale rates in timber and supplies and by the cheapness of the land. They are also arranged so that one chimney and one soil pipe take care of two houses.

The architects are also planning two-family houses at Whiteville, which are to be rented for \$8 a month, and single houses that rent for \$16 to \$18. Whiteville is a well known community of 2,500 men and their families, and is beginning to be developed along a twenty-five year development scheme just initiated.

The Whiteville community is being laid out in accordance with the best practice in landscape architecture, with the houses placed zigzag so that each has a lake view, and lawns planted with shrubs that will bloom successfully throughout the year. There is a community playground, beach and baseball field, with a pine grove on a hill-top to add picturesque.

The \$6-a-month houses have each six rooms and bath and cellar. Most of them are patterned artistically after the New England cottage type. A porch runs the length of each building, though there are separate entrances with latticework to divide off the veranda. From the hall one enters a fourteen by fourteen foot living room into a kitchen of the same dimensions, which has many windows on the rear of the living room on the front. Moreover, the kitchen has a view to a place to place for the dining table, conveniently near the pantry, and the sink next the stove.

The second floor includes a bath, with the plumbing fixtures of the two adjoining houses back to back and next the chimney to prevent freezing and two rooms with closets.

The two family houses renting for \$8 include furnace, coal bin and set tubs in the cellar, with a first floor living room 12 by 17 feet; this having windows on two sides and off the opposite side of the hall a dining room 12 by 18 feet, opening into a good kitchen with china closet and refrigerator with outside ice box. There is a coat closet off the hall and a bathroom. The second floor contains two large bedrooms, arranged to accommodate the beds out of the crowd, bath and broom closet. The third floor also has two rooms. Some of these are done in stucco and look very pretty.

The \$16 and \$18 single houses have each of them a living room, 15 by 24 feet, with a fireplace, a dining room 14 by 15, and a kitchen arranged with a range, china closet, pantry and sink in an efficiency circle. Upstairs are four good bedrooms and on the third floor three more.

This building is being done on a paying basis by contractors. The firm has its own carpenter shops, which reduces the cost of the operation. The architects think, however, that such building would be quite possible to a co-operative group.

TAX MEANS \$33 A YEAR TO THE AVERAGE MAN

How The New Canadian Budget Will Hit

BRINGING IT RIGHT HOME

It Will Take About 2 3/4 Per Cent of Average Salary of \$1,200—Applying the Tax to the Necessaries of the Household

(Toronto Star)

Now that the atmosphere is clearing so that he can get a good look at the thing, the average man is wondering where the budget's new war tax is going to hit him. Bitter experience has taught him that whenever the business or social world upturns it settles firmly down again on his shoulders. From the figures given by manufacturers, and counting only the articles which he will be sure to use and which are affected by the war tax, a working-man with a salary of \$1,200 will find his expenses increased at the rate of about 2 3/4 per cent. That is, he will be giving of his salary \$33 a year for the war budget directly, with, of course, many copiers here and there in indirect ways.

The following table demonstrates this in the most moderate possible terms.

Prices to Rise Yet.

The average man's expenses will be higher than this, of course. For example, oilcloths and carpets will be affected, though the dealers cannot yet say how much. Still Canadian industry will be stimulated and in time the imported goods will not be missed. Silks and staves will also suffer, but the spring shipments are already in, and for this year at least prices will remain unchanged.

"We have been exporting our butter very largely," said a wholesale dealer, "and with this tax it is possible that butter will rise as we will have to import some."

So great has been the demand on the factories for woolen goods to supply the army that the manufacturers are not showing any sample of new weaves whatever. Coverts and serges are impossible to get. Despite the heavy tax on cotton, cotton goods for the summer will also suffer, but the spring shipments are already in, and for this year at least prices will remain unchanged.

As this is the first tax to be imposed on hides, and as manufactured boots and shoes are taxed, these will rise in all grades at least fifty cents a pair.

As the straw in women's hats is of no moment whatever so far as price is concerned, and as Toronto women are largely making over their last year's hats for war year, millinery will not rise because of the tax on straw. As a matter of fact, women's hats never sold cheaper in Toronto—that is, since they evolved from being just straw hats to being near-Paris models.

Made in Canada furniture is largely used by the average man who does not dress his house in periods. Woollen stockings are not much worn in summer, but the tax on cotton hose will not increase them beyond five cents a pair. Oranges and bananas are expected to rise about five cents a dozen, and nuts at seventy-five cents a pound have long passed from the menu of the average man.

All things considered his burden is not so heavy as he probably thought it when the list first appeared. At least his larger share will come so indirectly as to be paid by a method of painless extraction.
