MONTREAL, Dec. 2-The lower ock gate of lock No. 2, which had been out of commission since Sunday, was finally repaired Tuesday afternoon. The Torhamvan, which had been waiting until the repairs had been made, as she is too large to descend by the northerly and small series of locks, came through at 5 o'clock Taesday evening.

Almost as soon as the one lock was placed in commission, lock No. 2 of the smaller series was placed out of commission through the fact of the lower gate being prevented from closing. A diver was sent down into the ley water, and for some time searched along the sill of the lock for the impediment. At 6 o'clock the lock was still out of commission, but it was expected to be in operation at a late hour the same night.

Many lake boats have been waiting above Black's Bridge to come down, a double line stretching right up to the Montreal Dry Docks, Ltd. Through the fact of one of these vessels refusing to await its turn to enter the lock it went aground on a narrow shoal to the side of the channel, where it was not expected to go.


