Many friends will regret to learn of the sudden death of Robert S. Craig, of 142 Princess street, which occurred at his home shortly before midnight last night. Mr. Craig had been in his apparently usual good health up until 6 o'clock last evening when he complained of a headache and was compelled to retire. Dr. M. H. Case and Dr. L. A. McAlpine were immediately summoned and found Mr. Craig in a critical condition. 



COURT BLOCKS MARRIAGE.

Divorced Man Who Took Second Bride Cannot Wed Third Time.

New York, Dec. 22.—When Clarence C. Stein was divorced in New York in 1914 by Mrs. Edith Stein her decree forbade him to marry again during her lifetime. He remarried in Connecticut in 1916, and on October 11 last he divorced his second wife. He then applied to Supreme Court Justice Mullan to modify his first wife's decree to permit him to take a third wife in New York state. He told the court that he has conducted himself properly since he was divorced here. It is on such proof that divorce decrees are modified as requested.

Justice Mullan denied Stein's application, and said:

"If its lack of merit were not so grotesquely plain, the application would be an impertinence. The man who was denied the right to remarry frankly states that he did remarry, and yet he talks about his good conduct."

WOULD EXHUME BODY.

Insurance Company Issues Writ Against Estate.

Kingston, Nov. 22—The London and Lancashire Guarantee and Accident Company of Canada has issued a writ against the estate of the late Frank V. Samwell, broker, of Kingston, for a declaration that the company is not liable to pay \$7,500, the amount of an accident policy issued by the company. The company is desirous of having an autopsy on the body.

Mr. Samwell met death at Collins Bay on October 13, while fishing, and Dr. D. E. Mundell, coroner, who examined the body, pronounced death due to drowning.

MAN ENABLED TO SOAR BY MEANS OF OXYGEN

Paris, Nov. 22—Flight to rarified altitudes, and even to the moon, is now possible for human beings without being equipped with special breathing tanks, through a discovery by Dr. Bayeux, which has been communicated to the Pasteur Institute. An injection of oxygen replaces the artificial respiratory tanks hitherto in use. Dr. Bayeux has proved the feasibility of his discovery by its use in the Alps, where he ascended 18,000 feet without the slightest difficulty.
