HRONG IN TRIBUTE TO BERT WILLIAMS

service in Masonic Temple in New York—Burial in Woodlawn.

New York, March 8.—A throng which filled the Masonic Temple of St. Cecilia and overflowed in the street yesterday afternoon gathered in connection with the funeral of Bert Williams, the famous negro comedian, who died here on Saturday. Scores of his former associates, officers of the lodge and prominent members of Williams' own race, who had come from southern and western states, accompanied the body to Woodlawn cemetery.

This was the first time that a negro was buried with the Masonic ritual in his state, according to officers of the fraternity. Williams was a member of Varsity Lodge, No. 897, of Scotland, and was at the cabled request of the Grand Lodge of Scotland that the services were held at St. Cecilia, known as the "Theatrical Lodge of the City."

Williams' Masonic sheepskin apron, received from the lodge in Scotland, was laid in the coffin. An orchestra from Broadway musical show played the funeral march. Soloists from some of New York's most exclusive churches sang the Lord's Prayer. Among the prominent negroes present were Charles V. Anderson, supervisory agent of the department of agriculture, and Henry T. Junger, baritone at St. George's, Protestant Episcopal church, where the late Williams' favorite hymn at his funeral was sung. Some years ago Williams was of the noted comedy team of Williams and Walker.

LABOR HAD SETBACK

J. H. Thomas on London County Council Election.

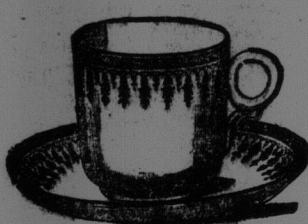

Interest in the London county council elections outside of London was not very great. Except where Labor already possessed material representation many seats were uncontested. Labor gained a majority there three years ago, but the subsequent rise in rates resulted in the formation of a special association to combat the labor activities.

J. H. Thomas, the railway leader, who is generally considered the most statesmanlike of the Labor leaders in the country, and who insistently preaches moderation, has declared that the result of the London county council elections is the most serious setback the democratic movement has yet received. While not interpreting the result as a refusal of the electors to trust Labor, Mr. Thomas says it certainly is a sign of the alarm of the electors concerning the Poplar methods of administration. He declares that Labor must show that it is not out to govern merely for one section of the metropolis.

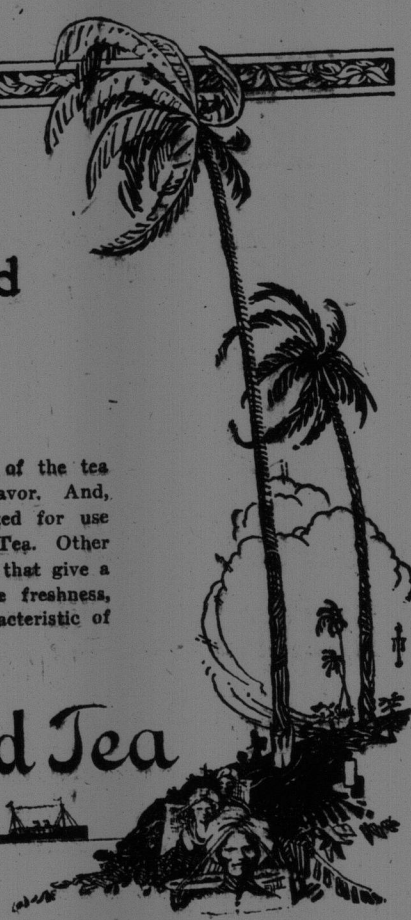

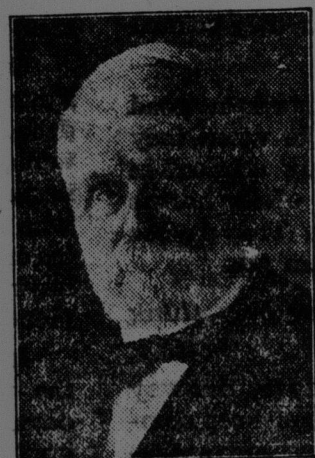

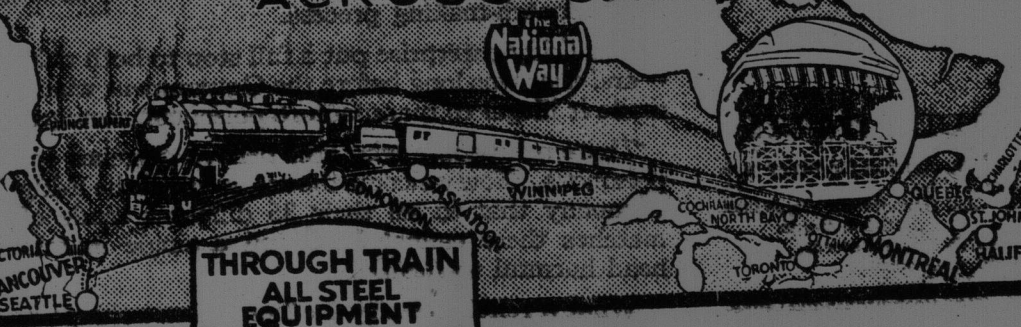

GANG FOREMAN KILLED

NIAGARA EXPLOSION

Niagara Falls, N. Y., March 9.—One man was killed and ten others were seriously injured yesterday by dynamite explosions during blasting operations in a tunnel construction. The dynamite was part of a charge that had been previously used in the rock and had failed to explode with the remainder of the load. The dead man was James Judge of Buffalo, foreman of the gang.

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
