

## LOCAL NEWS

A delightful band concert was rendered by the 62nd band in King Square last evening. Although the weather was not all to be desired, a great many people enjoyed the concert.

A jitney operating in the West End had a narrow escape from an accident near the mill pond last night. The driver did not gauge a turn correctly and headed for a ten-foot drop to the mud flats. He applied the brakes and came to a stop about two feet from the edge.

A small boy ran out in front of a moving bus in Main street last night, and only by a great effort in applying brakes and steering into the gutter did the driver save the youngster from being struck.

No decision in a speeding case against G. H. V. Belyea was handed down by Magistrate H. J. Anderson at Renfrew last night when the hearing was resumed. The evidence of Mrs. Belyea and Mr. Belyea's daughter and W. Dalton was taken. The case was postponed for judgment till Monday next.

## CAPTAIN BELVEA'S SON TELLS TALE OF FATAL COLLISION

The New York Times, reporting the collision of the schooner E. Marie Brown and the steamer Harmodius off Fire Island, in which Capt. B. W. Belyea, formerly of St. John, and three of his crew were drowned, tells of the rescue of the captain's son, Howard Belyea, and two Norwegian seamen, and says they were saved in a lifeboat lowered from the steamer and taken to New York. When the Harmodius arrived at Pier 3, Erie Basin, one of the sailors was still unconscious from shock and merriment and was sent to the Long Island City Hospital.

The Times story continues: The younger Belyea, deck engineer on the schooner, said that the weather was clear and the vessel about thirty miles southeast of Fire Island when the steamer was sighted coming head on. "It was a peculiar accident," he said, "and difficult to explain, because everything occurred so quickly."

"I was standing by the galley at the time and heard my father give the order to the man at the wheel to starboard the helm, and he obeyed. The steamer was supposed to go to starboard at the same time to avoid our colliding with each other. There was not much wind at the time and the schooner might not have shifted her course as quickly as she was expected to do. The next thing I remember was seeing the steel bow of the Harmodius crash right into the port side of our vessel just before the beam and make a big hole through which the water poured in tons. We had a big cargo of coal which put the Marie Brown down deep and she went under by the head in less than three minutes. Before the boat from the steamer could reach us my father, the cook and two Norwegian sailors were drowned."

## CRUEL GUIDE RUSHES WOMEN FROM HOUSE

Washington, July 19.—Led by an official Capitol guide—who taxed them twenty-five cents a head—nearly one hundred women from different parts of the country swarmed into the house galleries during the tariff debate and saw what they had hoped to see—a woman member in action.

Just after they sat down, Miss Alice Robertson of Oklahoma, the only woman representative, arose. Her voice does not carry far, and the women spectators, thrilled as the old-time crowds were when Joe Cannon was in action, leaned forward, cupped their ears and tried to listen.

Miss Robertson had not concluded all of her five-minute appeal for free hides, however, when the guide, uttering a shrill signal, led the crowd away. They had to go or else hire another guide for the rest of the racing trip through the corridors and to the senate gallery.

## MAID FIRED HER

NEW YORK, July 19.—Cora Spaulding, thirty-three years old, a negro, of 160 West 142nd street, who said she was employed as a maid for an actress in "The Follies," was fined \$25 by Magistrate Frederick House in Traffic Court for speeding and operating her large seven-passenger eight-cylinder touring car without a license. She said she had no idea that she was speeding, adding that she very seldom operated her own car.

"And who usually runs it?" asked the court.

"My chauffeur, of course," returned the maid. "I fired the last one two days ago. I found out that when I wasn't using the car he took it to the beach and entertained his friends, so I gave him the sack. But it's really so hard to find a good chauffeur that I've decided to learn to drive the car myself."

## GUilty OF KISSING HIS OWN WIFE

A public bathing beach is no place for a husband to hug and kiss his wife, Recorder Alfred Hux of North Bergen, N. J., ruled when he found Matthew Marquard and his wife, Lillian, Union Hill N. Y., guilty of disorderly conduct. They had engaged in a public demonstration of their affections at the swimming pool in Columbia Park, North Bergen, on Thursday night. He let the couple off with a suspended sentence.

"It is rather unusual these days to see a man kissing another woman's husband, but for a man to hug and kiss his own wife is unusual," The Recorder added that it was highly commendable for a husband to hug and kiss his wife, but that a public bathing beach was not the place to do it.

Mr. and Mrs. Marquard, who have been married two years, were frolicking on the beach, after a swim in the pool, when their lovemaking attracted the attention of Special Officer Maltz. Mr. Marquard admitted in court that they were playing leap frog and that he had sat on his wife's lap and hugged and kissed her. They continued their display of affection despite the warning of the officer, and, after they had donned their street clothing, were taken to the North Bergen station and registered as disorderly persons.
