No one could feel it a sacrifice. Examples of all the different modern schools—the English, French, Italian, Russian and Scandinavian, could be arranged in programmes according to nationality, or they could be contrasted, interspersed with programmes of the older classics. Oh, the store is so rich, I'm afraid one could arrange programmes indefinitely. Again this may have the same drawback to which one of the controversial letters alluded, that the musician being insufficiently rewarded cannot devote all of his time to the arranging recitals, then there is but one remedy, the public must pay or do without their musical education.

Band concerts given in the open air on a week day should be purely amusing—the one-step, two-step, all the popular melodies that the boys are whistling on the street—to lift the hearts of the masses; and if we only could have our younger folk dancing on our sidewalks all the better. In France when the music is playing, the people are dancing and dancing. That is what I claim kept up her wonderful morale. They could speak French, for they were in Paris, and the French spirit is unquenchable.

Perhaps little groups may sing, and plenty of dance music, not too much of the American, but some English and especially the French merry tunes. "On with you, let joy be unconfined." And thank you and trusting not to have imposed too much upon your space, I remain,

Sir—see Mr. Robertson is still setting forth his views as regards band concerts and quite correctly. As a Music Lover, Well, perhaps my standard is not very high in his estimation. I do not think that what the Wagner style of music of the proletariat played under circumstances which have a tendency to cause me to love it, and I do not rank very high as a musician, but music that was good enough to follow into almost certain death, and was good enough to amuse a pleasure-seeking crowd on a peaceful summer evening. I suppose it is only a matter of sentiment with me. I do not expect anyone to adopt my ideas on the matter. I have consulted Mr. Webster concerning that word "proletariat" and for the benefit of anybody who might be as ignorant as I will say it means in the first place "pertaining to the common people." It also means "low, vulgar, the lowest class of citizens." I don't pretend to understand the Wagner style of music. I suppose it sounds all right to those who do. Say, is that name not pronounced as though spelled with a V? Wagner? Over in France we generally tried to have our passwords and counter-signs spelled with a W, as in Wagner. I have heard that the common pronunciation that letter otherwise than V. Yes, my friend, I fear that the admirers of the high-bred Wagner style of music in St. John. As Mr. Fox says it would sound empty "king square." I have seen where some of our best bandmen lie and can say that they were men who did a man's part; and I know that those that are left are trying to please the majority of the citizens. More power to them.

(Boston Globe)

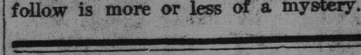

NICELY ROUNDED BILL AT THE OPERA HOUSE

New Programme of Vaudeville and "The Tiger's Trail" Enjoyed Last Night

The new offering of vaudeville at the Opera House last night attracted a large audience. Some of the acts were especially clever and evoked much applause. While there were many good laughs in the programme and music and dancing to a generous extent. Another chapter in the highly sensational serial drama, "The Tiger's Trail," was presented, showing Ruth Roland in a series of adventures from which only a motion picture actress could emerge alive and smiling.

The Barra Sisters gave quite a pleasing musical and vocal act. Their debut numbers were especially well received. A bright comedy skit was given by Lorraine and Chase interspersed with songs and dancing. They put their number over in snappy style. "The Ups and Downs of an Aviator," a ventriloquist sketch given by Captain Powers and Company, was the occasion of much amusement. Ryan and Healy gave a singing and dancing turn of which the dancing was undoubtedly the better part, while Scottie Brown with his fiddle provided a very entertaining number. The bill rounded out quite well and the audience enjoyed the various features.

BIG DEAL IN NEW YORK PROPERTY.

The largest sale of Times square property, New York, in recent years was completed recently, when Vincent Astor closed a contract with Robert E. Simon for the sale of the property known as the Putnam-Shanley Building and Westover Court, on the west side of Broadway between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets.

The plot, which has a frontage of 300 feet 10 inches on Broadway, is improved with a six-story fireproof building of terra cotta. It is fully leased until 1924, and yields a large annual rental. Adjoining it in the rear, fronting on Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, are ten five-story buildings. They were originally private houses, but several years ago were remodelled into stores and apartments by the owner and named Westover Court. These buildings are also fully leased.

It is contemplated erecting a large moving picture theatre on the street plotage of that portion. Under the agreement, the purchaser is not compelled to take the property if such possession is not secured. It is believed the deal involves something like \$50,000.
